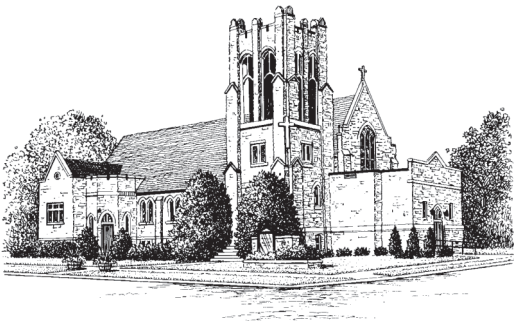

What Has Christmas Brought Us?

Now that Christmas has come and the 12 Days are soon ending, who is this Christ whom we have welcomed again with such festivity? That's not such an obvious question. In a time when folks self-identify as being spiritual without being religious, Christianity often degenerates into being religious without the Christ-big on self-improvement and emotional experiences but weak on what it means to confess faith in Jesus Christ.

The classic book by J.B. Phillips, *Your God Is Too Small*, is a book that still "speaks" to our time—both to us Christians who are big into faith but not so big into Christ, as well as a helpful antidote to the angry ravings of the "new atheists" who so ferociously attack a "God" in whom Christians do not really believe.

In both cases, their "God" is too small, and yet not small enough. Throughout the ages, people had looked up into the heavens in search of God. Bearing Jesus in her womb, holding Jesus in her arms, Mary looked down into the face of God. Christmas reminds us that we too look upon God this way. It is an important theological principle: *Finitum capax infiniti*, "the finite is capable of the infinite", the man Jesus is fully the eternal God.

Call it a paradox, call it a tension, better yet, call it the Incarnation. How can modern man believe in miracles, when he knows how to switch on a light bulb? Or why pray for the

healing of a headache when Tylenol works so well? The birth of Jesus is the forging of an unbreakable union between the miraculous and the ordinary. All our thinking, our creativity, our science, our labors, along with our sorrows and disappointments, is participation in the life of God become man.

[Jesus of Nazareth] "was not a kind of demon pretending to be human; He was in every respect a genuine living man. He

was not merely a man so good as to be "like God"—He was God. Now, this is not just a pious commonplace: it is not a commonplace at all. For what it means is this, among other things: that for whatever reason God chose to make man as he is—limited and suffering and subject to sorrows and death—He [God] had the honesty and courage to take His own medicine. Whatever game He is playing with His creation, He has kept His own rules and played fair. He can exact nothing from man that He has not exacted from Himself. He has Him-

self gone through the whole of human experience, from the trivial irritations of family life and the cramping restrictions of hard work and lack of money to the worst horrors of pain and humiliation, defeat, despair, and death. When He was a man, He played the man. He was born in poverty and died in disgrace and thought it well worthwhile." [Dorothy Sayers, *Creed or Chaos*]

Saying this does *not* give Christianity an easy explanation for the noisy atheists or the shrill voices of Christless Christian-

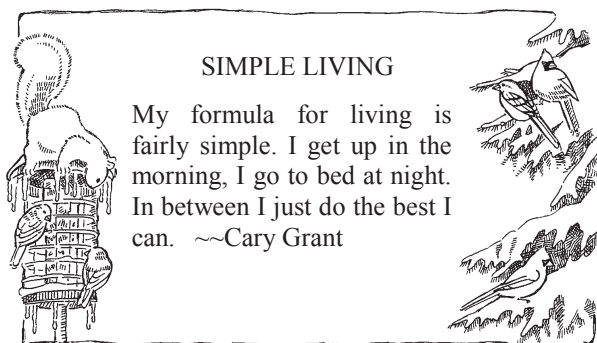


ity. What this understanding does is tell a story about Jesus, not as simply a teacher, a moral example, or even as one who saved people from a doomed world. He is the One on whom the dark forces of chaos converged, in the cynical politics of Herod and Pilate, the bitter fanaticism of the Pharisees, the wild shrieks of diseased souls, the sudden storms on the lake. Jesus' death is like Jonah's being thrown into the sea, and swallowed by the monster called Death. In His death God has taken upon Himself the full force of the world's evil.

As we launch into the deep waters of another new year, a reacquainting of ourselves with the Christ is the kind of resolution we would do well to embrace in place of shallow, emotional religiousness or a shrill reaction to the secularizing changes of our society.

Dear Saints of St. Peter's

“Christian wives will also discover no better role model than Mary as they strive to be that type of a woman that God instructs them to be. As the husband cares for his wife and thus is an icon of Christ caring for the church, so the wife, as she nestles under the protective love and care of her husband, becomes an icon as to how the church shelters her members under the love and care of Christ. Joseph's attention was centered on Mary as she cared for the Christ Child. And thus Mary could give her own attention to the child, for she knew that her husband would protect her and care for her so that in firm confidence of such love of Joseph she could nourish the child. With this in mind, Paul could urge all Christian wives to be subject to their husbands' love and care as the church is subject to Christ so that the wives could care for the children of their own bosom, devoting themselves to such care, because they knew in firm trust that their husbands would never remove from them their sheltering love and care—as also the church cares for people as she serves them in the Gospel in the confidence that Christ will never leave her (Eph. 5:24-28; 1 Tim. 2:9-15). The Christian wife then becomes a role model of motherhood after the example of Mary the mother of Jesus (cf. Titus 2:3-5). As she carries out this godly motherhood under the protective love and care of her husband, she becomes an example for all women to share the Gospel of Christ with others as Mary did (Luke 1:39-55; John 2:5; cf. Luke 24:1-12). The wife then also becomes a model of Christian piety and guidance of others (2 Tim. 1:5), an example of a counselor to her husband and to other men in authority (Prov. 31:10-31; Rom. 16:1-3),⁸ and a guiding example to be emulated by young women and mothers (Titus 2:4-5). Last to mention but not the least, such a godly woman and wife becomes a loving and touching picture of Jesus shedding tears, before Lazarus' grave (John 1:28-37) and over Jerusalem (Luke 19:41-44), as she weeps over her own children and over the children of others (Jer. 31:15; Luke 23:27-31). In the shedding of such tears she does so in the firm confidence of God's love in Christ that all such tears will be wiped away in the glory of God's promise of eternal life (Jer. 31:15-17; Rev. 7:13-17; 21:3-4; cf. Is. 25:6-8).” (265-266).

We, as Christians, by the way we live out our lives and order our families give a profound testimony to God's love for his creation and his people. As Christians, our lives and families should look different from those of the world, and as we look for an example to show us how to live and how to raise up our children, there is no better example than the family into which our Lord and Savior was born.

LIGHT SWITCH COVER

Celebrate
*"A New Year and
 A New You!"*

Everyone who believes in God and lives for him is a child of light. Make this cover for your bedroom light switch to remind you to be a light for God.

What you need:

- An adult to help
- Light switch cover
- Screwdriver
- Colored paper
- Markers
- Scissors
- Decoupage glue
- Paintbrush
- Craft knife



What you do:



1. Remove the screws from the cover.
2. On the paper, draw small images related to light and write out "Live as children of light" (Ephesians 5:8, NIV).
3. Cut out the drawings and verse. Make sure they'll fit on the cover.
4. Paint the cover with a coat of decoupage glue, and then immediately place the drawings and verse on the cover.
5. Paint over them with another coat of glue. Let it dry.
6. Turn the cover over and use a craft knife to cut out the opening for the light switch.
7. Using a screwdriver, place your new light switch cover on your wall.

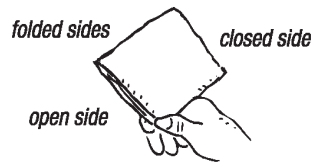
Make a paper noisemaker to celebrate with.

You will need:

- * a piece of notebook or copier paper
- * crayons or markers
- * ruler
- * scissors

How to:

1. Cut a piece of paper 7" or 8" square.
2. Color it or write "Happy New Year & Happy New You" on it.
3. Fold paper almost in half. The bottom edge should be 1/2" from the top. Crease the fold well. 
4. Fold in half side-to-side with the shorter flap inside. Crease well. 
5. Hold the paper tightly between thumb and index finger at open corner where there are only 2 thicknesses.
6. Quickly flick your arm and wrist downward. The inside paper will pop out and make a loud snap.

COUNCIL NOTES – December 14, 2010

On November 29, 2010, Pastor Hendrickson called a special Council meeting via email asking the council to call a Special Voters' Meeting as pledges and contributions had indicated that proceeding with the organ project was viable. Twelve yes answers from the Council via email allowed for calling the Special Voters' meeting on December 5, 2010. A postcard notice was sent to all voting households in the congregation.

President Witt welcomed all voters and thanked them for their attendance at the Special Voters' Meeting.

The main order of business was presented by Bill Steffenhagen. He stated pledge drive and memorial funds toward refurbishing the organ console and adding digital capability to the organ has now reached \$105,000. The total cost of redoing the organ will be approximately \$125,000. The organ repairman will be able to begin work on the organ in December. Organ console parts can be ordered from Walker Technical Company. Mr. Angerstein will revoice the pipes at this time, and he will replace parts of the organ console. (Currently many glitches are fixed by use of sandpaper, duct tape and taking a wire from a lesser used key to repair a more often used key.) Once he is finished with this portion of the revoicing, the sound of the pipes will be more clear and pure. Due to another repair commitment, Mr. Angerstein will then return in February and March to finish the repair and installation of the organ console in time for its use at Easter Services. The piano will be used a couple of times for music in December and about two weeks in March during repair. Some discussion followed.

John Penschorn moved to proceed immediately with repairs. Mark Witt seconded. There being no further discussion a secret ballot was cast. Votes cast were unanimous in favor of the motion, and it carried.

Greg Frank moved to adjourn the meeting. Mark Witt seconded, and the motion carried.

The December 14, 2010 meeting was called to order by President Tim Witt. Vicar Sherman gave opening devotion from the Gospel of St. John I, Chapter 12, followed by prayer.

The **agenda** was presented, and Bill Steffenhagen moved to accept. Mark Schoeckert seconded, motion carried. The **secretary's minutes** were read. No changes or corrections were made, Mark Manke moved to approve. John Penschorn seconded, motion carried. The **Financial Secretary's report** was presented. Bill Steffenhagen moved to approve. Steve Paskey seconded, motion carried.

The **Treasurer's report** was given by Cynthia Thurston. There was discussion about the size of the Braun bill for elevator repairs. Because this bill does not match work completed, it was decided not to pay until clarifications are made. There was also discussion on the mission's pledge not reaching the mission's goal. There was an Arlington EMS request by Rusty Rogers. Motion was made by John Penschorn to deny this request based on information gathered from our legal counsel. Seconded by Greg Frank, motion carried. There was discussion about finalizing organ pledges and making the payment that is due for work being done on the organ now. The checkbook balance is very low and some bills may not get paid this month. The budget committee has met and worked out a budget for 2011, and has determined that while finances are becoming a concern, the new budget does not have room for cutting. Bill Steffenhagen moved to accept the report. Mark Manke seconded, and the motion carried.

The **Board of Elder's report** includes letting the council

know that elder mailings have gone out. Feedback was good as these mailing included a small gift to church members. Military packages have been sent. Vicar Sherman reports on what he is learning. He reported on the young people's activities after ball games, Free Friday Fun Night. It was decided to have our high school youth get out word and invite other youth to these community connection activities. Mark Schoeckert moved to accept the Elder's report. Sandra Sandstrom seconded, and the motion carried.

The **Trustee's report** was given by John Penschorn. Ceiling repairs in the chapel entrance are almost complete. Christmas trees, decorations and creche are up. The back wall of the church, behind the organ pipes, will be insulated with Trustees doing the work. This will help organ sound and protect the pipes. Mark Manke moved to approve use of building funds to pay for ceiling repairs and insulation. John Penschorn seconded, motion carried. Verna Mueller moved to accept the report. Lynnette Taylor seconded and the motion carried.

Board of Education report was given. Enrollment at the CCC is steady at 31. Many of these are part timers. Sunday school programs are being presented on December 19, and on December 24. There will be no Sunday school on the 26th or on January 2, 2011. There will be a free of charge Friday Fun night for youth on January 21st. (The community service referred to in earlier minutes). Bible classes will meet as usual and take time off during Christmas break. Tuesday Bible class and classes between services on Sundays will resume in January. Brad Zimmerman has stepped down from the Board of Education. Greg Frank moved to accept the report, John Penschorn seconded, and the motion carried.

During the **Pastor's report** it was reported that Advent Services were well attended. The choir will be performing on the 19th and the 24th 10:00 service. In January Vicar Sherman will be planning some type of outreach project. The choir will perform *Jesus Christ, Superstar* sometime in February. Pastor will be on vacation during Christmas Break and attended the funeral of an Aunt in Iowa so he was gone for three days. There no membership changes, but there are some new potentials. Mark Schoeckert moved to accept the Pastor's report. Steve Paskey seconded, and the motion carried.

Under **Old Business** was an organ update. Repairs are fairly detailed in voicing of the pipes and the swell motor. (This is like a volume knob.) It was noted that keeping air temperature constant around the pipes will help prolong their life. Therefore, the earlier notes about insulating the west wall.

The budget committee will report in January. The nominating committee has been asked to add a name to replace Brad Zimmerman on the Board of Education. This report will be forthcoming in January. The Annual Voters' meeting has been set for January 30th at 1:00 P.M. Greg Frank made this motion. It was seconded by Bill Steffenhagen, and was carried.

The Council decided to give smaller bonuses this year due to the lack of funds. Pastor will receive \$250, Vicar Sherman, Organist David Hoffelt, and Secretary Lynnette Taylor will receive \$75 apiece. These will be presented on Sunday, December 19th. Greg Latzig moved to give these bonuses. Verna Mueller seconded, and the motion carried.

The Lord's Prayer was recited and Mark Schoeckert moved to adjourn. Greg Frank seconded and the motion carried.
