Concluding Thoughts for this Church Year

What we learned from the Beloved Disciple, St. John, in our summer sermon series through the Book of Revelation, St.

Matthew also teaches in his way through the three parables that will bring the Church Year to an end in the early weeks of November. Jesus sets the hope of His disciples, then as now, not on the "what" that is to come, but on the "who." With Matthew, as with John, this makes all the difference between the hype and hysteria of so many "end-times preachers" and the quiet hope that is proclaimed by Jesus Christ.

Matthew, chapter 25, records three of Jesus' more famous parables. We will meet each of them in the first three weeks of November, concluding on Christ the King, November 20th.

The Parable of the Wise and Foolish Virgins (Matthew 25:1-13) makes clear what Jesus has created within the lives of His disciples, namely, that waiting on Him is no mere agonizing experience but is already a time of joy, a foretaste of the full joy of heaven. The parable shows that Christian hope is no Pollyanna affair concerning the prospects of the future. Christian hope lives within the realities and responsibilities we have in the present time.

This realism concerning the present time, living with the already-present sense of joy in Christ toward the future, colors

the second parable in Matthew 25, The Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30). Here Jesus reveals Himself as the Giver of every gift, distributing His gifts according to His own purposes and not according to the merits of the recipients. Every gift

from Christ, whether great or small, carries its own claim upon the recipient. Jesus' gifts summon the recipients to put those gifts to use in proportion to their faith. It is not the return on the investment that is of most importance to Jesus, but the faithfulness of the recipients with their gifts.

That second parable ends with a note of judgment on the faithless recipient, but it is the third parable in Matthew 25:31-46 that sets judgment front and center. All the nations of the earth appear before the glorious King in that image of the sheep and the goats on His right and left. These

are the peoples of all time and places to whom the Lord has proclaimed His justice, among whom His work of hope has been going on, who have received His promise in the Gospel. Yes, there are also those present—the goats on His left—who have hated His gifts.

Yet even here in the dreadful scene of judgment, Jesus' parable speaks of grace and mercy. "Depart from Me, you cursed, into the eternal fire *prepared for the devil and his angels.*" (Matthew 25:41) The eternal damnation is made for the devil and his angels, not for human beings, the creation of




God's own heart. For God sent His Son into the world so that all people might be saved. The tragedy here is that despite the mercy of God toward all people, there are still those who want nothing to do with Him. So they make an alien doom their own

Still the string of three parables ends with the emphasis on mercy. Christ the King recites the mercies of the faithful, burying their sin in His forgiving silence. He remembers only their acts of loving kindness and invites them to come to Him and the Kingdom He has prepared for them.

There is so much to ponder in these three parables. There is so much to convict us of our own failings, to be sure, yet there is so much more to ponder about God's never-failing love toward us. It is a good way to bring the Church Year to a close!

Dear Members of St. Peter's Lutheran Church,

Among the Feasts and Festivals listed in our *Lutheran Service Book* is Reformation Day on October 31. But did you know that it's only a lesser festival? Of all the "protestant" churches, shouldn't the Lutherans be the ones to under-



stand Reformation Day as more than just a minor event? In a word, no.

WHAT? You mean Reformation Day isn't the most important day in the LUTHERAN church? Nope, and not by a long shot. The most important day in the church is The Festival of the Resurrection of our Lord, better known as Easter Sunday. The Reformation isn't about the Lutheran Church, and it isn't about Martin Luther. And it's not about the Roman Catholic church or the Pope, either. The Reformation is about Jesus. It's about what we believe, teach, and confess regarding who Christ Jesus is and what He has done for us. And if someone were to knock on your door and ask what you believe, teach, and confess about Jesus, the easiest place to do is remember your catechesis and go to the Second Article of the Apostles Creed:

And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary. suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. The third day He rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God the Father almighty. From thence He will come to judge the living and the dead.



This is what we confess on Sunday morning, and if someone off the street asked you what you believe about Jesus, you can give a clear and explicit answer by recalling the Apostles Creed. And have a Small Catechism handy, because Luther's

"What does this mean?" for the Second Article is helpful, too. (I won't include it all here, but it starts with "I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the Virgin Mary, is my Lord..."

As he grew up, and especially the time he spent as a monk, Martin Luther saw God as a judge, but only as a judge. It's true that Paul writes that Christ will return on the last day in Glory to judge. But that's not the whole story. Paul also writes in 1st Timothy that Christ is our Mediator. And in 1st John, we see that Christ is our Advocate, you could even say our defense lawyer. So Jesus isn't just the Judge, He's also our lawyer who represents us (*pro bono*). If you misunderstand who Jesus is, as Martin Luther did early on, you see what kinds of problems you can find yourself in.

I could go on and on, but it's all about Jesus. Easter is about Jesus, Christmas is about Jesus, Reformation Day is about Jesus. It's all about Jesus.


Create this festive sign, which will serve as a yearlong reminder to be grateful.

What you need:

- Hole punch
- Large piece of cardboard or cardstock
- Twine
- Twigs
- Iwigs
 Glue
- Acorns, leaves (real or silk) and raffia

What you do:

- 1. Punch two holes in the top of the cardboard.
- 2. Thread twine through the holes and tie it in a knot (for hanging).
- Using twigs, spell out "Be Thankful," "Thank God" or a similar phrase about gratitude. Glue the twigs onto the cardboard.
- 4. Decorate the sign by gluing on acorns, leaves and raffia.
- 5. Hang up your sign. Whenever you see it, think of something for which you're grateful to God.




You will need:

- · a fine-tooth comb
- · waxed paper
- tape


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How to make:

Cut a piece of waxed paper as wide as your comb and long enough to wrap completely around it.



Wrap the paper around the comb. Make sure the points of the teeth are under a fold of the paper. Tape it in place.



How to play:

Point the teeth of the comb up. Hold the comb very close to your lips. Hum a song of praise! Be sure to hum with your mouth, not your nose! Your humming will cause the wax paper to vibrate, sounding like a kazoo!

COUNCIL NOTES – October 11, 2011

The October 11, 2011 meeting of St. Peter's Church council was called to order by President Bill Steffenhagen at 6:30 P. M. Members present were Tom Crum, Greg Frank, Steven Hustad, Mark Manke, Shannon Rohrbeck, Sandra Sandstrom, Bill Steffenhagen, Lynnette Taylor, Cynthia Thurston, Corinne Tuschl, Brad Zimmerman, Pastor Hendrickson, and Deacon Josh Schroeder. Marvin Manke, Verna Mueller, Steven Paskey, Keith Podoll, Glenn Puntney, Michael Post, Mark Schoeckert, Mary Taylor, and Mark Witt were excused. The opening devotion was given by Deacon Schroeder and was taken from Matthew 22:15.

The **agenda** was presented, changes to membership will be added. Greg Frank moved to approve the agenda with the change. Brad Zimmerman seconded, and the motion carried.

The **Secretary's report** was read. No changes were made. Cynthia Thurston moved to accept minutes as read, Tom Crum seconded, and the motion carried.

The **Financial Secretary's report** was given by Corinne Tuschl. There were no questions about the figures that Corinne reviewed. Sandy Sandstrom moved to accept the report, and Mark Manke seconded. The motion carried.

The **Treasurer's Report** was given by Cynthia Thurston. The water bill for the church and the vicarage were the exact same amount but after talking to the Village, they assured us that was correct. All other bills seem to be normal and expected. Greg Frank moved to approve the report. Steve Hustad seconded, and the motion carried

The **Board of Elder's Report** was given by Greg Frank. He stated that they have filled the vacant Elder position. Bill Steffenhagen has appointed Tom Daugherty for the remainder of this term. The Christian Women's Council packed and sent



100 Personal Care Kits to Lutheran World Relief as well as sent \$275.60 for delivering those kits. A big thank you went out to the CWC for the cake that was shared by the congregation in celebration of Pastor

Hendrickson's 20th anniversary at St. Peter's. Tom Crum moved to approve the report. Corinne Tuschl seconded, and the motion carried.

The **Board of Trustee's report** was given. The carpet from the side aisles has been removed to help improve the acoustics in the sanctuary. There will be someone coming in to stretch and tack down the carpet in between the pews and the altar. The brittle tiles in the side aisles will be replaced in the next few months at no cost to the congregation as a family has come forward with a donation to accomplish this replacement. The new Zephyr blower for the organ will be here sometime in October and when a more specific time frame is known, help will be rounded up to get it and the box upstairs to the blower room. Brad Zimmerman moved to approve the Board of Trustee's Report, Tom Crum seconded and the motion carried.

The **Board of Christian Education Report** stated there are 29 enrollees in the CCC. Four-Year-Old Pre-K class has an enrollment of 19, four of them have wrap around child care. This 3rd year for the Pre-K Partnership with Poynette Schools is going very smoothly. The Annual Fall Bake Sale held Sunday, October 2nd, raised \$835 for the licensing fees that are incurred

by the Center every year. Thank you to all of the participants in the bake sale. The CCC children visited the Arlington Fire Station on October 11, in honor of Fire Safety Month. HS Youth group in an individualized get to know what they want stage. Midweek students are



preparing for their annual fall outing on October 19th. Bible study classes for Sunday between services have almost completed Witness, Mercy, and Life Together. Friday Men's Bible Study will continue their study of the Book of Matthew. The Women's Bible Study group continues to study Acts at the home of Marie Cook on Tuesdays. The Sunday School Bike-athon was well attended including a few neighborhood children who thought it looked like fun. Four of the kids made the full 50 laps around the church block. Corinne Tuschl moved to approve the report, Mark Manke seconded, and the motion carried.

Pastor Hendrickson's report stated that it has been interesting having 20 midweek students right after school on Wednesdays. They are all engaged in learning so the lessons have been going very well. The handbell choir is 10 strong and will debut on Oct 16th. The vocal choir has been having fun with their new pieces as well. Pastor indicates that he is aiming for an organ dedication ceremony to take place before Thanksgiving. The Christmas season will be unusual this year with Christmas Day being on Sunday so the Council will be asked about schedule changes next month. Cynthia Thurston moved to accept the report. Mark Manke seconded, and the motion carried.

The Church Council was asked to receive the transfer of Beverly Wheelock from *St. Paul's Lutheran Church (LC-MS)*, Madison, WI and to approve the transfer of Mary Veldkamp to *Faith Lutheran Church (LC-MS)*, Green Bay, WI. Shannon Rohrbeck moved to accept these transfers, Sandy Sandstrom seconded, motion carried.

New business was the Voters' Meeting agenda with the reminder that Budget and Nominating Committee members will need to be appointed and elected. Pastor also reminded the council that during the Annual Meeting in January the congregation will need to elect one lay person to be the congregational delegate at this year's District Convention. It was also stated that the Budget Committee will need to keep in mind that the District will assess fees for the convention to be held in Mequon next year. The Lord's Prayer was said. Sandy Sandstrom moved to adjourn, Corinne Tuschl seconded, and the motion carried.


