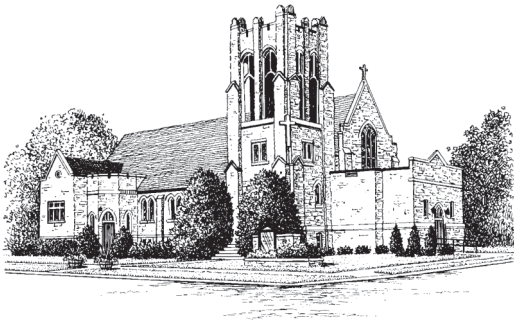

For all the hype of what's new for Christmas, when it comes right down to Christmas, it's not what's new that's important. What is important is what remains the same! Christmas is about what's real. What's important. What endures.

At Christmas there has to be a Mary and a Joseph and a Baby Jesus. And there has to be no room for them in the inn. Or what? Like this year the innkeeper says, "What do you know, I just got a cancellation. You can have the executive suite. And I'll give it to you for the cost of a regular room." No. No room. The stable. The manger.

And there must be "shepherds abiding in the fields keeping watch o'er their flocks by night." And there must be an angel, and a multitude of the heavenly host. And there must be, there's gotta be: "Fear not, for behold I bring you good tidings of great joy...unto you is born...a Savior, Christ the Lord." It's like the former Christmas Eve gatherings of my extended Hendrickson-Jorgenson families. We knew what the menu would include. As a child I hoped it wouldn't, but I knew it would be there...that Fish. And you endured all the stories about de ol' days, fidgeting impatiently for the really important moment of opening gifts. And every year it was the same, because it was who we were. Or what? Like this year we're suddenly Swedish? *Uff da!* And in some years faces would be gone—we mourned and we remembered. In other years new faces were present, who were welcomed and teased about The Fish. It was reality at its deeper level.

So at Christmas, St. Peter's, too, is family; a very large family! And everything we do here reinforces that. We are part of the Christian Family, marked by the curious birth of a Baby Boy, laid in a manger. We are the Family whose Founder was once a stranger in His own land, whose Father is the Almighty. We are the Family that has been fractured and restored more times than anyone could ever count. Yet even wars find a strange calm on this night because what is truly real has a way of impressing itself upon the surreal of any given moment.



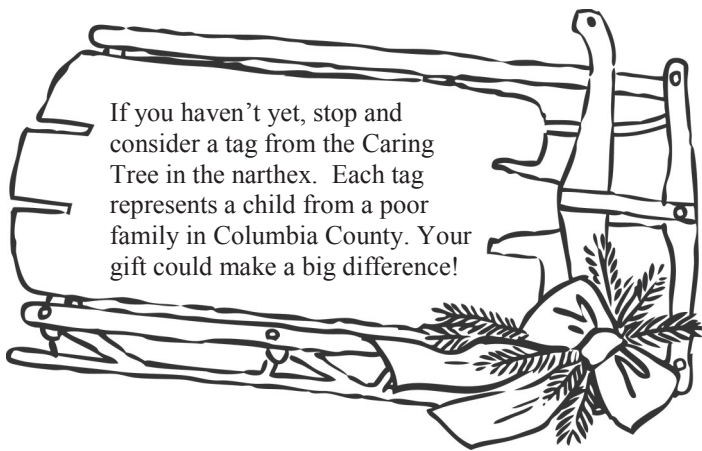
We are the Family compelled—not by force, but by faith—compelled to tell again the story of our family, though we know that story already. We tell it again and ponder all these things in our hearts.

This month I'm writing about the day AFTER Christmas known to many as "Boxing Day." And it's only fitting that a deacon would write this article—you'll see why in a little bit.



Remember the first line of Good King Wenceslas? He "looked out, on the Feast of Stephen." On December 26, the Church remembers St. Stephen, a deacon in the early church, who was the first martyr. We know about St. Stephen because he is mentioned in the book of Acts. This book is also where we see the first deacons, because the Apostles found themselves spending more time "waiting tables" than proclaiming the Gospel, so the deacons were chosen to take on as their primary task the "waiting tables" which included things such as feeding the poor, taking care of widows (they didn't have Social Security in Bible Times, so if you were a widow, this implied that you didn't have a backup plan for your livelihood), and helping the Apostles in various ways. So deacons have always had a role in the Divine Service (like how I assist in the liturgy) but what distinguishes a deacon from a priest (pastor) is that the deacons are known for doing "mercy work."

So when the Church celebrates the Feast of St. Stephen, the Church also recognizes in general the work that deacons are known for. Years ago, churches would have a special box for collecting money throughout the year, and then on the Feast of St. Stephen they would unlock the box and then distribute all the money to those in need, and that is why December 26 is known as "Boxing Day."



In The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, the office of deacon as it was known in the early church is actually pretty scarce, but don't be under the false impression that our church body no longer shows mercy. In fact, when the president of our Synod, Rev. Matthew Harrison was elected in 2010, his administration started a three-fold emphasis which summarizes most, if not all, of the things the church does: Witness, Mercy, and Life Together. Each of these is based on a Greek word in the New Testament and the Greek word that they've translated into our English word "mercy" is "diakonia." and this happens in a lot of different ways, some of these ways are official, others are unofficial. One thing in particular is the work of *LC-MS World Relief and Human Care* which has been responding to disasters all across the globe over the last 10 or 15 years. so when they are providing shelter and food for the displaced or treating the sick and injured or whatever else they might do, they usually do so in cooperation with our sister church body in that country, or if it's in the United States, in coordination with the District Office and on behalf of congregations in those areas. They show mercy to the victims in the name of Christ Jesus.

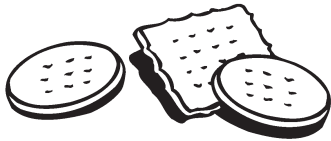


Spread a little cheer

What you need:

COUNCIL NOTES – November 13, 2012

The November 13, 2012 St. Peter's Church Council was called to order by President William Steffenhagen. Members present were Steve Hustad, Greg Latzig, Mark Manke, Marv Manke, Verna Mueller, Keith Podoll, Glenn Puntney, Shannon Rohrbeck, Stephen Saager, Jennifer See, William Steffenhagen, Lynnette Taylor, Mary Witt, Elizabeth Hutchinson, and Deacon Schroeder. Tom Crum, Tom Daugherty, Greg Frank and Michael Post were excused; Sandra Sandstrom, and Brad Zimmerman were absent.

The opening devotion was given by Deacon Schroeder. Deacon Schroeder gave the council members their choice of devotions and it was decided to pursue the devotion that would test our memories. Martin Luther said that people should not take communion if they did not know the Lord's Prayer, The Creed and The Ten Commandments. The Lord's Prayer and The Creed are usually known but the Commandments and the order they come in can be a little more difficult. A memory, recognition game was played that made it easier to remember the order of the commandments. The Council members had fun and tested their memory at the same time.

The **Agenda** was presented. Mark Manke made a motion to approve the agenda, Keith Podoll seconded and the motion carried.

The **Secretary's minutes** were read. Jennifer See made a motion to approve the minutes, Lynnette Taylor seconded and the motion carried.

The **Financial Secretary's Report** was presented by Mary Witt. Total offerings for the month of October were \$20,114.75. Marv Manke made a motion to accept the report, Mark Manke seconded and the motion carried.

The **Treasurer's Report** was presented by Jennifer See. In the General account, there is \$9805.15 available for expenses as of November 1, 2012. The Council did not have any questions about the report. Steve Hustad made a motion to accept the report, Mary Witt seconded and the motion carried.

The **Board of Elders Report** was presented. The Christian Women's Council has their annual Cookie Walk and Craft Sale Saturday November 17, 2012. Sixteen pies have been pre-ordered. Mary Witt asked about the names of the Military people in the Sunday bulletins. Lynnette Taylor said that the names are received from families or individuals that have relatives or friends in the military. Currently there are not any of the military personnel serving actively overseas. The letter that is going out to households of members in the congregation will be going out shortly. A schedule of all the services during the upcoming Church Seasons will be included. The Spiritual Gifts Survey was addressed. Responses have been slow coming back into the Church office. Members are encouraged to take just a few minutes to fill them out and return them. Lynnette Taylor made a motion to approve the Board of Elders Report, Verna Mueller seconded and the motion carried.

The **Board of Trustees Report** was presented by Keith Podoll. The Christmas Trees will be going up soon but a date is not yet confirmed. Keith Podoll said that he has a number of volunteers that will help. After the trees are up the High School youth will decorate them. Two more bids have been received on the stair treads. It was decided to go with the first bid from *Canales Flooring*. They will do it on a Friday and Saturday when alternate stairs can be used by the Child Care Center. Jennifer See made a motion to accept the report, Mary Witt seconded and the motion carried.

The **Board of Christian Education Report**

was presented by Lynnette Taylor. Numbers in the Child Care & Preschool are holding steady. Sunday School is going smoothly.

The Christmas Programs have been chosen. The younger grades will have their program December 16th during the Sunday School slot and the older grades on Christmas Eve at 6:30 p.m. Bible classes are also going smoothly. Midweek had fall events scheduled but because of the weather events were postponed and then eventually canceled. They are now back to a schedule. Shannon Rohrbeck made a motion to accept the Board of Christian Education report, Jennifer See seconded and the motion carried.

The **Pastor's Report**. Pastor Hendrickson submitted a written report because he was unable to change the evening of the class he teaches. The past month has been very busy. There has been a lack of available substitute organists because they are busy elsewhere or have not returned the Pastor's telephone calls. Pastor Hendrickson and Deacon Schroeder have been handling the services with help from Rev. Laatsch and Rev. Rohde for the communion portion of the liturgy. There are two potential organists that could begin in January. With the Advent and Christmas services beginning soon Pastor will play as often as needed. Pastor thanked Deacon Schroeder for all the extra help during this time and the Council thanked them both for all the extra time they are putting in to make everything move along smoothly. The Choir and the Handbells had a wonderful performance on Reformation Sunday and the guest Orchestra members enjoyed performing this type of music in the church setting where it belongs. With the coming of Christmas the choir is busy preparing their music and later this winter they are planning on doing music from "Phantom of the Opera" in cantata form. The Veterans Day Church service was very well received, and the congregation was moved by the reciting of names and the many people they had forgotten. The Madison Brass also enjoyed the service. The Elder's Christmas letter is nearing completion but was not done in time for the Council meeting. The packets will be ready for the Elders the weekend of the 17th. The Pastor's report was approved by Keith Podoll, seconded by Greg Latzig, motion carried.

Membership Changes-- To remove by transfer to *Bethlehem Lutheran* in Sun Prairie are Rev. Wayne Dobratz and Asenath Dobratz. Marv Manke made a motion to approve the transfer, Glenn Puntney seconded and the motion carried.

Old Business--None to report.

New Business--The Budget and Nominating Committees are currently busy
