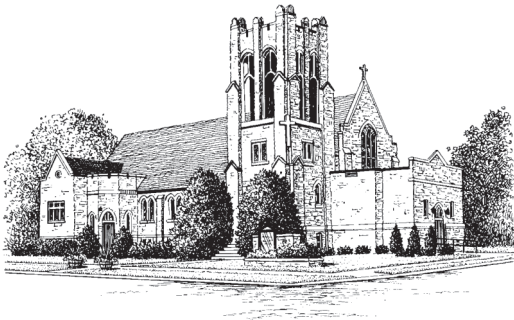

'Tis the Season

The prophet Malachi, chosen in Church tradition to conclude the Old Testament, has a word that is both a blessing and a warning. Yes, the Lord we seek will come, suddenly, to His temple. "The Messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed He is coming, says the Lord of hosts. But who can endure the day of His coming, and who can stand when He appears?"

This passage is echoed in the Book of Revelation, when the angel opens the sixth seal, and all who have trusted more in their own strength and wealth than in God—"the kings of the earth and the magnates and the generals and the rich and the powerful, and everyone, slave and free"—flee in terror to caves and hide among the rocks. They call to the mountains, "Fall on us and hide us from the face of the One seated on the throne and from the wrath of the Lamb; for the great day of their wrath has come, and who is able to stand?"

The infant Jesus who comes to us at Christmas is much easier to welcome than the One crucified at Calvary. And even less so, the One who will come at the end of time, the risen Lord returning, suddenly, and without warning. When Jesus comes to find us, our first instinct is to hide. Who can endure His anger over what we have done to the creation, to each other, and to ourselves?

It helps at this point, and as a new year is soon upon us, to ask ourselves the question Jesus often asked His disciples:

"Why are you afraid?" It helps to recall the burning bush God set before Moses, for God's fire did not destroy the bush. If we trust in God, we find more assurance than terror in the thought that God wants to purify us, so that everything evil in us turns to ash, and only the good remains. God's just anger is a refiner's fire: to suffer it is not a gentle thing, but the end result is pure beauty.



As we hear once again at Advent and Christmas—in the birth and ministry of John the Baptist, in the angel's announcement to Mary about the birth of Jesus, and in the unfolding of events in Bethlehem, mingled through by the tragedies that follow—the Lord whom we desire may indeed be close at hand, but it will not be easy for us to accept His call. What Zechariah said of his son, John, is really addressed to us all: "And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare His way, to give knowledge of salvation to His people by the forgiveness of their sins."

This was John's calling, and it is our own, a truth both consoling and terrifying. For we are enslaved, by selfishness and addiction and all the wreckage that sin can wreak on the world, but are we willing to risk being freed? Do we dare to enter the dangerous new country of life in Christ, leaving the comforts of sin behind? In desiring it, we come to believe that, yes, it is possible. For, why not? God is with us!

PEACE Wreath

What you need:

- Paint (blue and green)
- Paint brush
- Embroidery hoop
- 24 wooden clothespins
- Scissors
- Craft foam (white, red and green)
- Glue
- 3 white feathers
- Floral wire (two pieces)



What you do:

1. Paint the hoop blue and the clothespins green. When dry, attach clothespins around the hoop.
2. Cut a dove shape (slightly wider than the hoop's diameter) out of white foam. Glue on feathers.
3. Pierce the beak with a scissors tip. Slide a piece of wire through the slit to make an olive branch.
4. From green foam, cut out two leaves. Attach them to each end of the wire.
5. From red foam, cut out the letters P E A C E. Glue them onto clothespins.
6. Place dove in center of hoop. Glue its head and tail to clothespins.
7. Attach wire to the back and hang up your wreath.

JESUS' BIRTH FROM A-Z

What you need:

- Paper
- Pencils or pens
- Bibles (optional)



What you do:

Instruct players to think of as many Christmas-related words as they can that start with each letter of the alphabet. Start with A and give everyone a minute to brainstorm words for each letter. For example, M words include manger, Mary and miracle. If you get stuck, look at the Nativity accounts in Matthew 1 and 2, and also Luke 2. Players get a point for each word not repeated by others.

What you need:

- Butcher paper, poster board or plain wrapping paper
- Markers, paint or crayons
- Construction paper stars
- Tape
- Blindfold



What you do:

On large paper, draw a picture of a stable. Give each player a star cutout. Put a small + above the manger where the star led the shepherds and wise men to baby Jesus. Like in Pin the Tail on the Donkey, the blindfolded person who puts his or her star closest to the + wins.

COUNCIL NOTES – November 12, 2013

President Greg Frank called the November 12th, 2013 meeting of the St. Peter's Lutheran Church Council to order at 6:32 p.m. The opening devotion was given by Pastor Hendrickson from 1 Thessalonians Chapter 5. Paul ends his Epistle lesson saying, be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus; even when we feel that we have no reason to be glad or rejoice we can be assured that God is still with us and at work in all things.

The **agenda** was presented. Jennifer See made a motion to approve agenda, Brad Zimmermann seconded; motion carried.

The **Secretary's minutes** were read. There was one correction concerning Pastor's report. Pastor Hendrickson gave his resignation as Circuit Counselor to the district not to the synod. Steve Paskey made a motion to approve the amended Secretary's minutes, Jennifer See seconded and the motion carried.

The **Financial Secretary's Report** was presented by Mary Witt. Total offerings for the month were \$20,150.00. Missions are ahead of budget but the general fund is approximately \$10,000.00 below budget for the year so far. There were not any questions for Mary concerning the report. Jennifer See made a motion to approve the report, Brad Zimmermann seconded and the motion carried.

The **Treasurer's Report** was presented by Jennifer See. As of November 1, 2013 there is \$8,409.77 available for expenses. The organ loan balance is \$30,112.70 with interest on the loan costing approximately \$180.00 per month and the balance on the Vicarage is \$42,491.07. Brad Zimmermann made a motion to approve, Keith Podoll seconded; motion carried.

The **Board of Elder's Report** was presented. There was some discussion of decorating with poinsettias for the Christmas season and that maybe some members would like to purchase them. Mary Witt informed the council that Military Care is currently not sending out any packages because thankfully all service members are home. The Christian Women's Council will be meeting Sunday Nov. 17th between services to discuss the Cookie Walk Dec. 7th, 2013, the pie sales and elections for next year will also be discussed. Lynnette Taylor informed the council that college care packages will probably be sent out for Valentine's Day. Deacon Schroeder reported that he was very appreciative of the sermons Pastor Hendrickson wrote during his current medical issues and Pastor Hendrickson and the Council are very appreciative that Deacon Schroeder could step up and fill in when needed. Music Director Jeremy Zieroth reported that on Sunday December 22nd the choir will be performing 35 to 40 minutes of Celtic music called, "Tapestry of Light" at both services. Pastor Hendrickson has also been helping Jeremy line up musicians. Christmas letters will be sent out by Elders in the near future. Lynnette Taylor made a motion to approve the report, Mary Witt seconded; motion carried.

The **Board of Trustees Report** presented by Keith Podoll. Keith reported that there have been some issues with the front door handicapped access. A repair man was called from Braun Elevator because they had installed the door opener, but the repairman did not fix it and a bill was sent for work on the elevator that was not required. Lynnette Taylor has been trying to get this matter resolved with no success yet. The lights in the downstairs by the area that was the stage were blinking so Keith Podoll put in new ballast's. Keith is also working on the church humidifier. The Christmas trees were also discussed and it was decided that they should be up by Wednesday Dec 4th. Arrangements were made with Brad Zimmermann to get them on the Sunday before the decorating date so that workers can be

recruited to help. Jennifer See made a motion to approve the report, Lynnette Taylor seconded and the motion carried,

The **Board of Christian Education Report** was presented by Brad

Zimmermann. A search has begun for a substitute on-call teacher for the child care center when Amy Paskey leaves in January. Connie Hendrickson will replace Amy as assistant 4-K teacher. The Center's fall bake sale raised \$1200.00. This will pay the NAEYC dues of \$300.00, staff CPR & first aid training, staff continuing education, staff Christmas bonuses and curriculum for the children. Jordan Rittmeyer has tentatively accepted the Board of Education position to replace Lynnette Taylor in 2014 at the end of her term. The Sunday school is preparing their Christmas program. Practices for the younger children will be December 14th and 21st, and the older children will have practice the 7th, 14th and the 21st. The younger children will have their program December 22, 2013 and the older children on Christmas Eve. The Sunday school children raised \$893.00 for missions during their annual bike-a thon. There will not be midweek the week of Thanksgiving or January 1, 2014. The subject for Sunday Bible classes has yet to be decided; the Tuesday Bible class at Marie Cook's is discussing the Books of 1 Peter and 2 Peter and the Friday morning class is still discussing the role of male and female. Mary Witt made a motion to approve the report, Stephen Saager seconded and the motion carried.

The **Pastor's Report**-Pastor Hendrickson reported that he has lined up some families to talk with that reside in the Village of Arlington for his project to find out what people would like to see in Arlington and what they like about the area. He contacted these people through the child care center but this project will take place after the busy Advent Season. Pastor Hendrickson reported that he is feeling better but they will continue to monitor his medications and periodically run tests. Mary Witt made a motion to approve the report, Brad Zimmermann seconded and the motion carried.

Membership Changes-Keith Podoll made a motion to receive by adult confirmation Kristin Bitgood, Paul Nelson and his son Logan as a baptized member, Steve Paskey seconded the motion; all in favor. A motion was made by Steve Hustad to remove by transfer Albert & Lynn Porter to *Hope Lutheran Church (LC-MS)*, Fond du Lac, WI; Jennifer See seconded; motion carried.

Old Business-Steve Hustad reported that nominating committee is a work in progress. Steve has approached a few people about the Elder positions and currently there is one member who has accepted. Tom Daugherty's resignation as Elder was submitted to the Council. Because of health issues Tom feels he is not able to fulfill his commitment. The Budget Committee has not yet met.

New Business-There was much discussion on the Endowment Fund. The Council is concerned about the investment of the funds and how they are being controlled. Jennifer See reported that these funds go beyond being used for Scholarships and they are not to be used for any budgetary short falls. More discussion and updates will follow when everything is outlined in a report.

At 7:30 a motion was made by Keith Podoll to adjourn the meeting, Steve Paskey seconded and the motion carried. The Lord's Prayer followed. ~Elizabeth Hutchinson, *Secretary*


