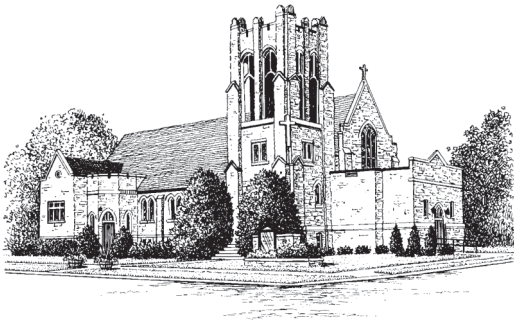

Who Makes All Things New?

Good Friday and Easter bring a strong dose of reality to a Christian congregation. An easy trap for many a serious Christian to fall into is the trap of envisioning what the Christian life in a congregation *ought* to look like, and then to set out and make that vision a reality.

The German pastor and martyr under the Nazis, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, whom I often quote (because his words are often so contemporary), put it rather bluntly: "He who loves his dream of a congregation more than the Christian congregation itself becomes a destroyer of the latter, even though his personal intentions may be ever so honest and earnest and sacrificial. *God hates visionary dreaming; it makes the dreamer proud and pretentious* [emphasis added]. The man who fashions a visionary ideal of congregational life demands that it be realized by God, by others and by himself. When his ideal is not realized [as indeed it will not] he becomes, first an accuser of his brethren, then an accuser of God, and finally the despairing accuser of himself." [Dietrich Bonhoeffer, *Life Together*, 1938]

Good Friday and Easter, Jesus crucified and raised up again, very quickly reveals that the Christian faith and our life together as Christians is not an ideal! It is not something we create. It is a gift, the new reality which God creates in Christ, and in which, through Christ Jesus, we may participate.



The cross and resurrection point us to a congregation that is both sinner and saint in Christ. The visionary dreamer accuses those who fall short of the vision. The Christian congregation, however, thanks God even in failures, for what He has done in Christ. There is thankfulness for what He has done, not despair over what He has not done or given to us. In every experience where disillusionment sets in, there the Christian fellowship gives thanks for the forgiving love of God in Christ.

"Just as surely as God desires to lead us to a knowledge of genuine Christian fellowship, so surely must we be overwhelmed by great disillusionment with others, with Christians in general, and, if we are fortunate, with ourselves. God will not permit us to live in a dream world... The more clearly we learn to recognize that the ground and strength and promise of all our fellowship is in Jesus Christ alone, the more serenely shall we think of our congregation, and pray and hope for it." [Bonhoeffer]

Good Friday and Easter, Jesus crucified and raised up again, has a very profound way of shattering human ideals and illusions, and of instilling in us that life and hope which is beyond all human comprehension.

Alleluia! The Lord is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

So will begin our Easter season on April 20 this year. After finishing out our Lenten season studying and learning about various temptations to which we easily

fall prey, discovering many ways this world is broken, including our Savior, and finally watching Him die for all of our sins and the sins of every person, we reach that glorious moment where Christ rises from the dead. At this moment the world starts to put together all of the events and see the great wonders that God had planned for us all along, confusing as it is to those who cannot see the big picture of the future. We in the 21st century are blessed with the hindsight of seeing the totality of Jesus death and resurrection, always knowing the link between the two, and getting to sing marvelous songs about them!

This month, we study a hymn that we will sing on Easter 2, April 27. This one is called *Christ Has Arisen, Alleluia*. It is one of the few hymns from the African churches that has crossed the ocean and reached us in the Americas.

Rev. Bernard Kyamanywa wrote this hymn while studying at the seminary called Lutheran Theological College in Makumira, Tanzania. Today, this is known as Tumaini University Makumira and is in Arusha (TUMA), some 50 miles west southwest of Mt. Kilimanjaro, the tallest mountain in Africa. Like our Concordia University System is to the LCMS, TUMA is the synodical college of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Tanzania (ELCT). Rev. Kyamanywa was born in 1938 in Tanzania. He wrote this hymn in 1966. It is based especially on Matthew 28:6, "He is not here, for he has risen, as he said."

This Easter hymn shares the glories of Easter and uses imagery that is rather striking. In stanza one, "our Redeemer burst from the tomb./ even from death dispelling its gloom." And then in stanza two, we sing, "For three long days the grave did its worst/ Until its strength by God was dispersed./ He who gives life did death undergo;/ And in its conquest His might did show." We see quite clearly that Jesus is greater than death. If he can defeat death and wants to give us His power, how glorious will our resurrection from death be, as well!

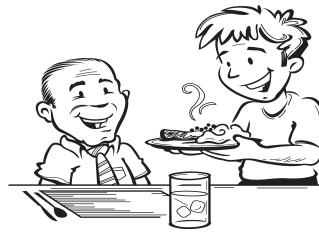
Stanzas three and four focus on the words of the angels as they talk to the women at the tomb. They came looking for Jesus, but cannot find him. "[T]he tomb is all bare; / Only the gravecloths are lying there." Our human minds are not used to seeing a dead person be not dead anymore. If we were to see it, many of us would just stand there, dumbfounded, mouths gaping wide open. This is likely what those first disciples and women were doing, so the angel then has to say in stanza four, "Go spread the news: He's not in the grave..the battle with sin is won!"

Each stanza is followed with a joyful refrain encouraging all to sing. We see 1 Corinthians 15 when we sing, "Death's fearful sting He has come to destroy." Where, O grave, is thy victory, and where is your sting, Death? Jesus has defeated you! "Let us sing praise to him with endless joy."

Translated from Swahili by Rev. Howard S. Olson (1922-2010), this is one of the works of Olson, who spent 43 years as a missionary in East Africa. One of his pastimes while there was collecting African folk tunes and adding Christian texts to them. While this text was not written by him, it has been translated into numerous languages and is now sung across the globe.

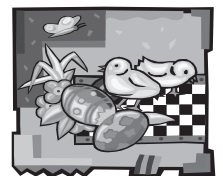

Easter Cake

Celebrate our risen Lord with this uniquely decorated cake.

What you need:

- Adult help
- Box of cake mix (any flavor)
- Tub of brown frosting
- Shredded coconut
- Green food coloring
- Chocolate Hostess Ding Dong cupcake
- Donut hole
- Pretzel sticks
- M&M's candies

What you do:

1. Bake cake in rectangular pan. When cool, frost it.
2. Pour coconut into bowl. Add drops of green food coloring. Mix until coconut resembles grass.
3. In one corner of cake, set Ding Dong upright to resemble a tomb. Place donut hole in front of it, to one side.
4. Make three crosses with six pretzel sticks and some frosting. Arrange on opposite corner from tomb.
5. Use brown M&M's to make a path from the crosses to the tomb.
6. Use other colors of M&M's to spell out "Jesus lives!"

Easter Crosses

Make this craft to remember what Jesus did for us. Hang it in your room to look at all year long.

What you need:

- Two 8" paper plates (white)
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Crayons, paints or felt markers
- Stapler, glue stick or glue
- Paper punch
- Yarn, string or ribbon (about 10" or 12")

What you do:

1. With your pencil draw a slight curved line all the way across the center of one plate. This will be a hill.
2. Draw three crosses on the hill. Make the center one a little bigger than the others.
3. Color the hill green and the crosses brown. Or color the hill and crosses black to look like a silhouette.
4. Cut out the hill and crosses as one piece.
5. Color the top half of the other plate with red, orange and yellow to look like an evening sky.
6. Staple or glue the hill-and-crosses plate onto the sky plate. Make sure you line up the bottom edges of the plates, and staple or glue just along the curved edges where the plates meet.
7. Punch a hole near the top of the sky plate.
8. Tie a loop of yarn, string or ribbon through the hole.
9. Hang your scene on your doorknob or on something else in your room.

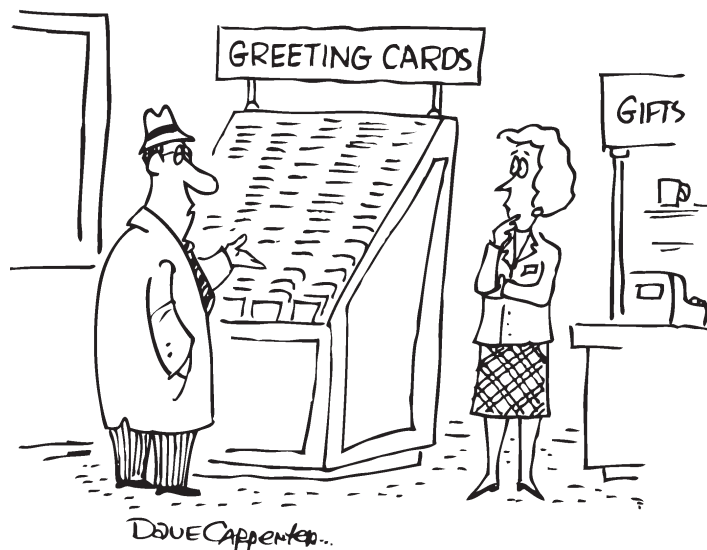

COUNCIL NOTES – March 11, 2014

President Greg Frank called the March 11, 2014 meeting of the St. Peter's Lutheran Church Council to order at 6:30 p.m. Members present were Greg Frank, David Hutchinson, Greg Latzig, Dale Johnson, Tyson Miller, Steve Paskey, Charlotte Reddeman, Jordan Rittmeyer, Shannon Rohrbeck, Jennifer See, Corinne Tuschl, Mary Witt, Elizabeth Hutchinson, Lynnette Taylor, Jeremy Zieroth, Deacon Schroeder and Pastor Hendrickson. Bill Manthey, Keith Podoll, Michael Post, Glenn Puntney, Stephen Saager, Sandra Sandstrom, and Mark Witt were excused; Vint Quamme was absent.

The opening devotion was given by Pastor Hendrickson from the classic Lenten Psalm 51.... The agenda was presented. A motion was made by Jennifer See to approve the agenda, Shannon Rohrbeck seconded and the motion carried.

The **Secretary's minutes** were read. It was noted that the word "be" was omitted from the Pastor's report. Steve Paskey made a motion to approve the Secretary's report with the correction, Mary Witt seconded and the motion carried.

The **Financial Secretary's Report** was presented by Mary Witt. Mary reported that the offerings for February totaled \$20,328.00. There were no questions for Mary. A motion was made by Corinne Tuschl to approve the report, Jordan Rittmeyer seconded and the motion carried.

The **Treasurer's Report** was presented by Jennifer See. Currently there is \$2000.00 less available in the checkbook for expenses. This is due to the extended unseasonably cold weather increasing heating bills. A motion was made by Greg Latzig to transfer \$900.00 from the Special purpose fund and \$1000.00 from the Pre-K fund to cover the energy bill, Corinne Tuschl seconded and the motion carried. A special thank you went out to Steve and Amy Paskey for plowing and shoveling snow and to Mark Witt for moving the snow banks back to allow for better parking. This has saved the church funds that can be used for other needs. The loan on the Vicarage recently came up for renewal and the Trustees have signed the new 3 year note. Cost for re-doing the loan was \$125.00, the interest rate remains the same at 5.875% and the payment amount will also stay the same until April 2017. The balance on the Vicarage is \$39,683.20. A motion was made by David Hutchinson to approve the report, Corinne Tuschl seconded and the motion carried.

The **Board of Elder's Report** was presented. There was nothing to report concerning the Ushers or the Altar Guild. Lynnette Taylor gave an update on the endowment fund. At the end of December the funds were at \$126,000.07. There are 3 portions of the funds and it was suggested that the committee needs to look at these funds and think about the options. Mary Witt has stepped down from heading up the Military Care after doing an excellent job in sending out packages to those who are serving and the Yamriska Family will be taking it over. The Christian Women's Council will be hosting the spring rally for the LWML and will be serving a lunch. Greg Latzig updated his report concerning a spiritual gifts outreach fair. Different booths could be set up for all the different programs, ministries and activities that the church has such as youth groups, CWC, Altar guild and maybe even have representatives from Thrivent or Oakwood Village just to name a few. Next month Greg will have a list of the different stations that could be included. After some discussion it was decided Rally Day would be the best time to hold the outreach fair. Deacon Schroeder had nothing to report. Music Director Jeremy Zieroth reported that everything is going smoothly. Jennifer See made a motion to approve the report, David Hutchinson seconded and the motion carried.

The **Board of Trustees Report** was presented. There was some discussion on having *Doering Lawn Service* do the fertilizing and weed control on the church properties. It would be done 4 times during the growing season costing \$110.00 each time. Steve Paskey made a motion to retain the services, Mary Witt seconded and the motion carried. There was some discussion on repairs and maintenance that needs to be done on the Vicarage. There will be further discussion at upcoming meetings. It was also brought to the Trustees attention that some fluorescent bulbs are burned out and need to be replaced downstairs in the church. When weather permits it was decided some landscaping around the church needs to be done. When a weekend is decided upon a signup sheet will be posted in the narthex. Greg Latzig made a motion to approve the report, Steve Paskey seconded and the motion carried.

The **Board of Christian Education Report** was presented by Jordan Rittmeyer and Charlotte Reddeman. Jordan reported that the child care center and 4-K are all running smoothly. The 4-K program is celebrating its' 5 year anniversary. There will possibly be an article in the Poyette Press sometime in April with the 4-K sites being interviewed. The child care center will be having its' spring bake sale on Sunday March 16th. Proceeds will help the budget during this time of low enrollment. The Sunday school continues to run smoothly. The High school youth will be attending the *Higher Things* conference at *Camp LuWiSoMo* instead of Mequon this summer because of space issues. The youth are currently planning for the Easter egg hunt and the Easter breakfast. Midweek Lenten dinners will begin March 12th. The students have been given schedules in regards to when they help serve and bring desserts. Charlotte Reddeman presented the idea of starting plans for a float in the Arlington parade. Different aspects of what St. Peter's has to offer could be incorporated into the theme of the float. A motion was made by Shannon Rohrbeck to approve the report, Jennifer See seconded and the motion carried.

The **Pastor's Report**-Pastor Hendrickson reported that his Village People project has come to a road block and that people were hesitant in meeting with him. Pastor Hendrickson feels he will have to take a new approach to it and resume it again this summer. Ash Wednesday got the Lenten season off to a good start. Faith bracelets were handed out at the end of the service and there were not enough to go around so more have been ordered. Pastor Hendrickson explained to the Council all the different procedures an Acoustic Consultant did concerning the sounds in the church with people absent and people present. The Consultant will give his recommendations and the different phases that need to be addressed. The last week of April is the placement service for Vicars and that is when the church will find out if we will have a Vicar. A motion was made by Mary Witt to approve the report, Corinne Tuschl seconded and the motion carried.

Membership Changes-None to report.

Old Business- None to report.

New Business-After some discussion concerning the date of the quarterly voter's meeting Jennifer See made a motion to hold the meeting April 27th, 2014 between services, Corinne Tuschl seconded and the motion carried.

At 7:40 p.m., Steve Paskey made a motion to adjourn, Jordan Rittmeyer seconded and the motion carried. The Lord's Prayer followed.


