

Bodies in Motion in Worship

When we hear someone talk, we don't just listen to their words. We combine what they're saying with their body language and any other information we have to put together a fuller picture of what's being communicated. The same is true in math with use of fingers (or maybe even toes).

More generally, gesture seems to be closely intertwined with verbal communication. What we say is tightly linked to what we do. Gesture seems to lighten the load on our cognitive systems. Research has shown for instance, that if you ask people to do two things at once — explain a math problem while remembering a sequence of letters — they do a far better job if permitted to gesture while explaining.

When we see and use gestures, we recruit more parts of the brain than when we use words alone, and we activate more memory systems - such as the type that stores automatic processes such as how to type or ride a bike—in addition to our memory for events and experiences.

This is a reality the church for centuries has grasped but all to many have abandoned out of fear, misunderstanding or most likely perceived embarrassment. The catechesis or teaching of signs and symbols and the meaning of ritual is ever declining in our technology driven, screen focused age which also has focused on head knowledge and eye entertainment over bodily worship and presence with God.

Our Lord who created us in body and soul, redeems us in body and soul, and even in the greatest summary of the commandments expresses, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength" (Deut. 6:5, Matt. 22:37, Mark 12:30, Luke 10:27).

How is this done? Well, it is in front of you in the hymnal.

With the symbol + you are invited to make the sign of the cross in remembrance of your baptism. At God's Holy name in the invocation and absolution, at the end of the Creed that was given and confessed at baptism, at the Lord's Supper where the baptized participate together, and at the giving of God's blessings at the Benediction.

It is done in standing before the King of Kings as He proclaims His Word of forgiveness, in standing to present petitions (requests) before Him in prayer, and in sitting to receive His instruction in the Old Testament and Epistle but standing to receive His testimony of the Gospel. We kneel in humility that we are receiving the greatest gift in the Sacrament that which we do not deserve.

We place our hands in gesture of prayer and either bow our heads or look up to heaven to pray, that they are free from other tasks and we are distracted. We bow our heads in humility before God.

Our Lord blesses and cares for us in body and soul. The body expresses and worships. Luther encouraged everyone to use these gestures at home, making the sign of the cross in the morning so that you went about the day with that bapistmal remembrance as you lived you life in Christ and again the evening as you rest in Christ's care and peace.

So use your hands, make these gestures, become comfortable with them, for they serve to teach and provide a more meaningful and fuller worship life in confessing God's presence and action for us in body and soul. For as we proclaim and receive the Lord's Supper that this strengthens and preserves you in body and soul unto life everlasting. Amen.

HYMN STUDY We sing "Hope of the World", LSB 690, this month. It's the Hymn of the Day for the 22nd Sunday after Pentecost, October 21/22.

"Hope" is an optimistic word that is used when there is an expectation or desire for a positive outcome. Today, it's often sim-

ply a "wish" with the chance that the desire may not be fulfilled. However, some dictionaries point out that the archaic meaning is quite different. Archaic "hope" meant an expectation that carried with it a sense of trust, certainty, and confidence



that the expectation would be fulfilled. This latter meaning is the import of the Greek word "elpidos" which in the New Testament is most often translated "hope," but in some translations, "confidence."

"Elpidos" or a related form occurs 53 times in the New Testament. Usually it's used in direct relation to the salvation and eternal life that is ours through the work of Jesus Christ, a work He already accomplished. Christ as our "hope" or "confidence" is one of the recurring themes of the Apostle Paul. In his greeting to Timothy, he simply states: "Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by command of God our Savior and of Christ Jesus our hope..." (1 Timothy 1:1).

In August 1954, the Second Assembly of the World Council of Churches was held at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois under the theme "Christ—the Hope of the World." In preparation for this conference, The Hymn Society of America conducted a hymn writing contest on the conference theme. From nearly 500 submissions, "Hope of the World" by Dr. Georgia Harkness (1891-1794) was the winner. The text first appeared in the July 1954 issue of The Hymn, the society's journal, as part of the President's Message. Due to its Christological focus, it has been included in 50+hymnals since.

This hymn develops Paul's theme of "Christ Jesus our hope". It's very clear that it is through Jesus' incarnation (st. 2), cross (st. 4), and resurrection we are eternally victorious (st. 5). The repetition of "Hope of the world" at the beginning of each stanza is a powerful rhetorical device that drives this point home.

1 Hope of the world, thou Christ of great compassion; speak to our fearful hearts by conflict rent. Save us, thy people, from consuming passion, who by our own false hopes and aims are spent.

2 Hope of the world, God's gift from highest heaven, bringing to hungry souls the bread of life, still let thy Spirit unto us be given to heal earth's wounds and end our bitter strife.

3 Hope of the world, afoot on dusty highways, showing to wand'ring souls the path of light, walk thou beside us lest the tempting byways lure us away from thee to endless night.

4 Hope of the world, who by thy cross didst save us from death and dark despair, from sin and guilt, we render back the love thy mercy gave us; take thou our lives and use them as thou wilt.

5 Hope of the world, O Christ, o'er death victorious, who by this sign didst conquer grief and pain, we would be faithful to thy Gospel glorious. Thou art our Lord! Thou dost forever reign!

When singing this hymn, it's important to remember the "hope" being referred to here is not simply a "wish," but eternal truth and certainty. It's good to recall the confidence and certainty Paul proclaimed regarding the eternal life that is ours through Jesus' death and resurrection:

"Behold! I tell you a mystery. We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed. For this perishable body must put on the imperishable, and this mortal body must put on immortality. When the perishable puts on the imperishable, and the mortal puts on immortality, then shall come to pass the saying that is written: 'Death is swallowed up in victory.' 'O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?' The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." 1 Corinthians 15:51-56

In the Lutheran Service Book, this poem is paired with the tune EIRENE by Frances R. Havergal (1836-79). This is the only tune from her in LSB, but one likely knows her poems "Take My Life and Let It Be" (LSB 783/4), "I Am Trusting Thee, Lord Jesus" (LSB 729), or "Now the Light Has Gone Away" (LSB 887).

As we continue to walk through Paul's Epistle Letters, this month we turn our attention to his Letter to the Ephesians. Luke, the physician, in the book of Acts (Acts 18:19-21) records Paul's preparing the way for his ministry in

Ephesus by his visit there when returning through Corinth to Israel at the close of his second mission trip. Those present at the Ephesian synagogue were so moved by Paul's words that they asked him to stay. Although staying was not part of God's plan for His church, Paul did promise to return. During the late summer of 62 A.D., while he was a prisoner in Rome awaiting the outcome of his appeal to Nero Caesar, Paul wrote three letters; to the congregation of Colossae (Epistle of Colossians), the letter to Philemon (on Onesimus' behalf), and to the congregation at Ephesus (Epistle of Ephesians) dispatching them by the same messenger, Tychicus (Eph. 6:21, 2 Tim. 4:12). Ephesus was the port for

which Tychicus likely sailed on his way to Colossae. Here, in this great city, Paul had worked at least two years, longer than he had labored in any other location in his ministry. With the help of the Lord and his assistants, he had spread the gospel from Ephesus into practically the entire province of Asia (Acts 19:10, I Cor. 16:19).

Unlike other letters Paul writes to first century congregations, in which Paul addresses various doctrinal errors that have taken place, his letter to the congregation at Ephesus is unique. News in return of the Ephesian congregation which Paul had received was favorable (Eph. 1:15). It seems troubles had not developed within the congregation therefore the letter does not address any particular doctrinal error or heresy. Rather than correcting, Paul encourages the congregation which explains the general character of the letter. Therefore, Paul writes to help his readers better understand the dimensions of God's eternal purpose, Grace, and to come to appreciate the high goals God has for the Church.

Through the same words that Paul uses to encourage the first century Church we too can find encouragement in these very words which are still relevant to our twenty-first century

church! Today's self-help culture tempts us to try to do it all ourselves. Yes, our personal credentials are important, however God's Grace remains the only basis of our salvation (Eph. 2:8-9). Paul writes in Ephesians 2:8 For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of through faith. God. Martin Luther expands on these words

beautifully in the Large Catechism. He writes, "It is like the benefit of the Lord Jesus Christ upon the cross, which is not a work, but a treasure included in the Word. It is offered to us and received by faith." (LC IV:37)

Martin Luther sought to and did reform the church of his time by refocusing our attention back to Paul's words in Ephesians (Eph. 2:8-9). As we approach Reformation Sunday, meditate upon the treasure, God's Grace, that is freely given to us through Word and Sacrament and not on behalf of our works or because of any merits bestowed upon us through the works of others. This treasure is freely given to you through His Church. In this beautiful letter Paul also writes about the


church, not a church building, but the Church that is made up of all Christians through all the ages (Eph. 1:22-23).

As we walk in life together, we receive these gifts in fellowship with one another. All Christians, baptized into Christ's name, are one family in Him and are called to act with love toward each other, study God's Word together, and sing with one joyful voice to the Lord a new song in the Divine Service, where Christ's gifts are freely given out, and we receive them with joy and thanksgiving for the forgiveness of sins.
