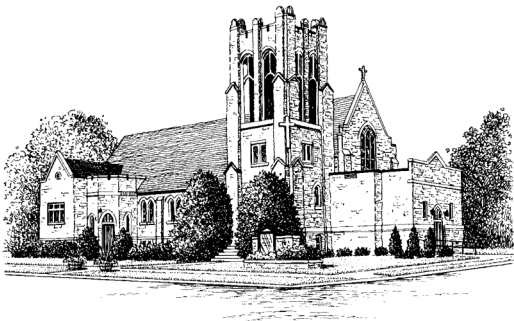

And notice that faith is a noun, a thing, not a verb, not something we do. It is a shield.

And notice that most of these are not offensive weapons. We are quick to seek to attack in this life. Most of what the Lord provides is defensive. That which He provides is preserve and keep you.

The one weapons He provides gives way to the reality that we are not fighting things of this world. We are not fighting against other people, we are not fighting against a virus, we are not fighting against opposing political viewpoints; we are in a fight against sin, death, and the devil. And so we have a two edged sword, that is the Word of God. It is our only weapon. Not our wit, not our business resources, not our votes, not our social and political sway, but only the Word of God. The sword of Spirit.

So keep alert. There are many things that the old evil foe will use to attack you. He is witty. He will work around to make you comfortable and let your defenses down. May God grant you grace to remain faithful that this armor provided is what endures and preserves you to the end.

Music Ministry



HYMN STUDY

As we continue through these challenging pandemic times and will be for some time, it's helpful to remember that, even when we don't know what lies ahead, our trust is that God is always taking care of us and providing for us. A great reminder of this comes in this month's hymn, "Lord, Take My Hand and Lead Me" which is LSB 722. We sing it August 9/10.

Originally written in German, this hymn has had different translations, but two stand out prominently. These were written by Rudolph John (1859-1938) and Herman Brueckner. The two mostly agreed on the text, both translations came up with a different beginning. Brueckner's was "O take my hand, dear Father," and published in the *American Lutheran Hymnal* (1930). Rudolph John's translation began "Take thou my hand and lead me," and was published in *The Evangelical Hymnal* (St. Louis, 1917). Both translations were successful, but our text comes from a compilation of the two: Brueckner's first verse (altered substantially), and John's second and third verse.

The author, Julie von Hausmann, was a brilliant young woman from Latvia who struggled with massive migraines. Born Julie Katarina Hausmann in Riga, Latvia, Julie's father taught in a Gymnasium there for several years. Her father then began to work as a counselor in the town, which made him a member of the Russian Aristocracy, and changed the family name to von Hausmann. She was to marry a young missionary in east Africa but he died shortly before her arrival to join him. Heartbroken, she returned to Latvia and became a governess. It was during this time that she penned this hymn. She cared for her father until he died in 1864, then moved in with her younger sister, an organist in Southwestern France. Eventually they met with their two other sisters, and

moved to St. Petersburg, Russia, where the oldest sister was the school director at St. Anne's Church.

While caring for her father, Hausmann's poetry was noticed by Pastor Gustav Knak, who asked if he could publish the collection. She let Knak publish her works on a few conditions: the works had to remain anonymous, and all proceeds were to go to a school/orphanage in Hong Kong. This agreement led to the publication of *Maiblumen* in three volumes.

The translator, Rudolph John, was born in Washington, Missouri, son of a pastor at St. Peter's Evangelical Church. He took an interest in the church, and studied at Washington University, then at Eden Seminary, being ordained in 1878. He served calls in Illinois, Missouri, and Virginia before settling at St. Paul's Church in Chicago, Illinois. He remained there for over 40 years. During his time at St. Paul's church, he held many different positions in the Evangelical Synod of North America.

The tune "So Nimm Denn Meine Hande" was written by Fridrich Slicher (June 27th, 1789-August 26th, 1860) and was published in 1842. It didn't get its name until it was published with this text 1883. Born near Berlin, Germany, Slicher studied music with his Father, an organist and schoolmaster. Slicher also studied music with N. F. Auberlin. Between 1806 and 1817, Slicher served many different teaching positions around Stuttgart, and eventually as the director of music and organist at the University of Tubingen. Slicher published five books of music and hymns.

1. *Lord, take my hand and lead me/ Upon life's way;
Direct, protect and feed me/ From day to day.
Without your grace and favor/ I go astray;
So take my hand, O Savior,/ And lead the way.*

This hymn is a wonderful prayer. The first stanza is a great reminder of all we confess in the creed. God takes care of all our needs. We need him to guide us and remind us of how to love. When we fail to hear His Word, we quickly fall from His path and start to make our own path, trusting in ourselves. So, we ask him to keep us on the correct path.

2. *Lord, when the tempest rages,/ I need not fear;
For you, the Rock of Ages,/ Are always near.
Close by your side abiding,/ I fear no foe,
For when your hand is guiding,/ In peace I go.*

This may be the hardest stanza to pray. We do not want to hear about the trials and storms that we have to walk through. No one willingly chooses difficulty. But, we do know that God can see the other side, and that he is more powerful than any struggle that comes our way. We also know that lessons are learned and faith is strengthened going through the hard times.

3. *Lord, when the shadows lengthen/ And night has come,
I know that you will strengthen/ My steps toward home,
And nothing can impede me,/ O blessed Friend!
So take my hand and lead me/ Unto the end.*

All lives have been impacted by sin, and our earthly life will cease. We ask in this stanza that God would keep us firm until the end he has determined for us, and then bring us happily to his side in heaven!

Feel free to pray this hymn more than when we sing it in church!

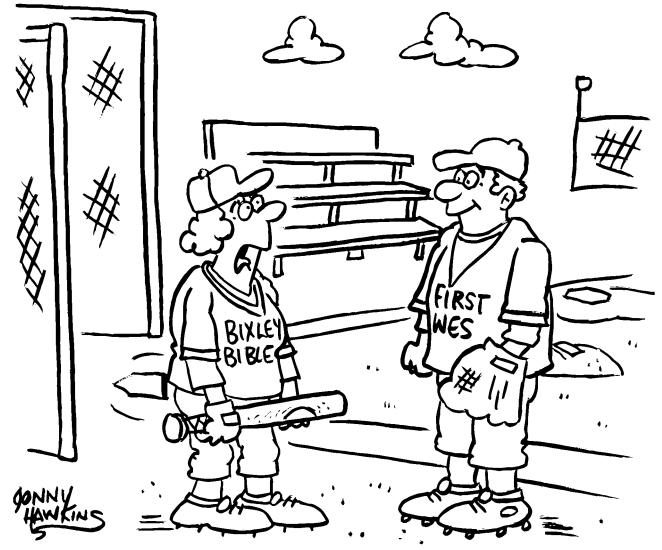

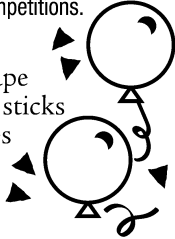

GREAT SUMMER GAMES

What you need:

COUNCIL MINUTES July 14, 2020



The July 14, 2020 St. Peter's Council meeting was called to order at 6:35 pm by President James Rittmeyer.

Opening devotion was given by Pastor Amen from Romans 5. Rejoice in our sufferings because suffering produces

endurance which in turn produces character which produces hope. Martin Luther says that the cycle is suffering-meditation-temptation back to suffering.

Agenda: Keith Podoll moved approval of the agenda as presented, John Peshorn second, carried.

Minutes: Paul Yamriska moved approval of the minutes of the previous meeting. Bill Manthey provided the second, motion carried.

Financial Secretary: Bob Hagenow sent in some figures pertaining to the giving and were read by Lynnette Taylor. They are as follows: Some analysis of current numbers:

Current year to date after 22 Sundays has general purpose offerings at 97.4% of the prior year and 90.8% of set budget

Current year to date mission offerings is 83.7% of prior year but 110% of set budget for the year

One year ago, general purpose offerings were 90.2% of set budget

For the month of June, 34% of the general-purpose revenue came in from online offerings (4921.00 of the 14310.00 dollars)

50% of the mission offering came in online (1065.00 of the 2108.00)

33% of the special purpose offerings were from online (245.00 of the 739.00 dollars)

Going back to the radio broadcast discussion, some analysis of the year may be of interest:

14 of the 52 Sundays had no sponsor for them so 38 Sundays did have sponsors

Quick math reveals that the church would have been responsible for 2520.00 of the broadcast costs (14 x 85.00 plus 38 x 35.00)

Total cost of the radio was 4420.00 for the year with only 1900.00 dollars covered by sponsorships.

Cameron Gramse moved to approve the financial secretary's report, John Peshorn seconded and the motion passed.

Treasurer: Barb Reddeman presented the expense reports with a current checkbook balance of \$23, 214.71. There was some discussion of logistics of the PPP and its status as a grant. Beth Hutchinson moved approval, John Peshorn seconded, carried.

Board of Elder report: The elder schedule seems to be working. Attendance was discussed and Pastor revealed that through the numbers that he can access through Facebook, St. Peter's is averaging 57 screens that watch our service at some point from start of service time on Sunday through reviews on Wednesday. July attendance is down but seems to

be comparable to other attendance figures from previous years. Cantor Jeremy Zieroth reported the Drama Day Camp musical was excellently done and the reception afterward was well attended. He will be having small groups or soloists through December rather than choirs.

Trustees: Keith Podoll reported that the requisite light bulb changes and minor repairs have been ongoing. Biggest project for the month was the replacement of the small water heater under the sink in the downstairs kitchen.

Board of Christian Education: The Child Care Center is officially at full capacity with 40 children enrolled. Everyone is staying healthy. Sunday School has continued into the summer via Zoom with Becky Amen hosting the call and teaching the lessons, and Bob Hagenow leading the songs and prayers. Attendance varies but is pretty consistent at 12-15 per week. Vacation Bible School is still intended to be held August 3rd -7th but the parent surveys seem to indicate that we will not be mixing the Child Care students with non-center students and will most likely be held during the evening hours. Friday morning men's Bible Study is going strong and the Monday evening Bible Study via Zoom has a consistent number of attendees.

Pastor's report: Pastor Amen reported that with everyone's help the cleaning of pews, narthex, and hand rails & light switches is going quickly each week. The livestream of the service is still going strong and for the last five weeks has been solely on the church's equipment. The fall activities (incl. Midweek, Rally Sunday, Sunday School, and the picnic) are all on hold at this time waiting for mandates to be announced

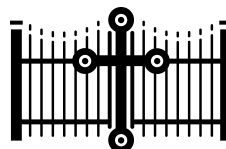
Transfers: None

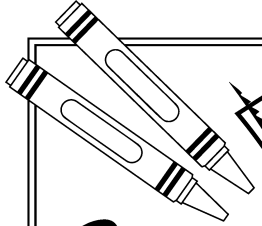

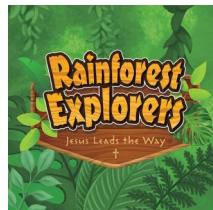
