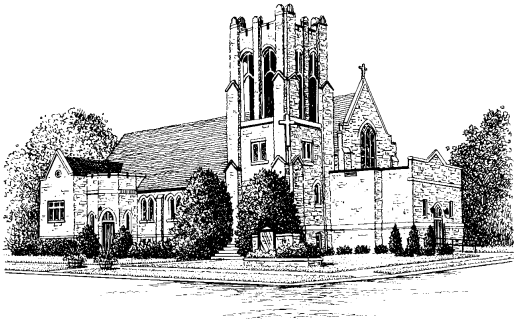

OCTOBER 2021

We celebrate the Reformation at the end of each October. The Reformation began on All Saints' Eve in 1517, which was when Martin Luther posted the 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. So, let's hear from Luther himself on the topic of giving and stewardship.

In the Small Catechism under the Table of Duties, Martin Luther gives specific Bible passages to help Christians know their duty in their various vocations as members of their family, society at large, and in God's family, the Church. Under the heading "What Hearers Owe Their Pastors," Luther lists five passages from the Bible, three of which have to do with giving to your local congregation. They are these:

"The Lord has commanded that those who preach the gospel should receive their living from the gospel." (1 Cor. 9:14)

"Anyone who receives instruction in the word must share all good things with his instructor. Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows." (Gal. 6:6-7)

"The elders [presbyters, i.e., pastors] who direct the affairs of the church well are worthy of

double honor, especially whose work is preaching and teaching. For the Scripture says, 'Do not muzzle the ox while it is treading out the grain,' and 'The worker deserves his wages.' " (1 Tim. 5:17-18)

Luther comments on these passages in his 1535 Lectures on Galatians. He wrote:

"When Paul says 'all good things,' this is not to be taken to mean that everyone should share all his possessions with his preacher. No, it means that he should provide for him liberally, giving him as much as is needed to support his life in comfort. ... The apostle is so serious in advocating this topic of support for preachers that he adds a threat to his denunciation and exhortation, saying: 'God is not mocked.' ... All this pertains to the topic of support for ministers. I do not like to interpret such passages; for they seem to commend us, as in fact they do. In addition, it gives the appearance of greed if one emphasizes these things diligently to one's hearers. Nevertheless, people should be taught also about this matter, in order that they may know that they owe both respect and support to their preachers. Christ teaches the same thing in Luke 10:7: 'Eating

and drinking what they provide, for the laborer deserves his wages'; and Paul says elsewhere (1 Cor. 9:13–14): 'Do you not know that those who are employed in the temple service get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in the sacrificial offerings? In the same way the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the Gospel should get their living by the Gospel.' It is important for us who are in the ministry to know this, so that we do not have a bad conscience about accepting for our work wages ... it happens when those who proclaim the glory of God and faithfully instruct the youth derive their livelihood from them. It is impossible that one man should be devoted to household duties day and night for his support and at the same time pay attention to the study of Sacred Scripture, as the teaching ministry requires. Since God has commanded and instituted this, we should know that we may with a good conscience enjoy what is provided for the comfortable support of our lives from church properties to enable us to devote ourselves to our office." (LW 27:125–126)

Hymn Study

Jan Michael Joncas (b. 1951) is a priest in the Roman Catholic Church, currently serving in the Minneapolis St. Paul Diocese and as Artist-in-Residence at the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, MN. He has composed more than 300 liturgical songs, but his name is widely known for one favorite: "On Eagle's Wings." We sing this hymn at our October 17/18 services this month, LSB 727.

In the 42 years since its publication, "On Eagle's Wings" has achieved global popularity, been translated into a variety of languages and become a Christian funeral classic (if not a staple).

Joncas wrote the song after he and a friend, Doug Hall, returned from a meal to learn that Hall's father had died of a heart attack. He doesn't recall ever meeting Hall's father, but he remembers wanting somehow to console his friend. "I knew this was a hard, hard experience in anybody's life, [and I] just wanted to create something that would be both prayerful and then comforting," he said.

In the days preceding Hall's father's wake, Joncas returned to his parents' house in Minnesota and composed the song on his guitar, sketching out a melody line and accompanying chords. The now-famous hymn debuted at the wake.

He kept the song under wraps for some time after that. "On Eagle's Wings" joined a group of compositions he held onto for sev-

eral years before submitting them to North American Liturgy Resources, who then offered Joncas an album deal. He didn't pay much attention to the hymn after that but became aware that the song was gaining popularity outside Catholic circles when his publisher forwarded him requests from other denominations to reproduce the song.

Then, following the 1995 bombing of the Federal Building in Oklahoma City, Cathy Keating, the governor's wife, requested that "On Eagle's Wings" be played at a memorial for those killed. Joncas recalled thinking, "Wow, this was way beyond even denominational stuff. This is becoming part of the culture." Two years later, Michael Crawford, the original "Phantom of the Opera" on Broadway, sang "On Eagle's Wings" on national television, surprising him again with how far the song had reached. But the crowning moment came when tuning into a broadcast of the funeral of a personal heroic operatic tenor Luciano Pavarotti.

"Suddenly the soprano [stood] up from the parish choir and...[sang] '*Sulle Braccia dell'Aquila*,'—'On the Arms of the Eagle'... It was now in Italian," Joncas remembers. "They're singing 'Eagle's Wings' at Pavarotti's funeral."

The whole experience was rather surreal for him, who thinks of "On Eagle's Wings" as a callow effort. He draws a parallel between "On Eagle's Wings" and Ravel's "Boléro:" it's not his best work, but he doesn't mind it being his most popular composition. "I think I've written deeper and better pieces, but this one, for whatever reason, touches people's hearts," he said.

He has been overwhelmed by the wide-ranging positive reception of the hymn. "The number of times people have come up and talked about the song touching them at really tough moments—I am pretty much just blown away by the experience that God can still use [it] 40 years after its creation and still have it impact people's lives. But I don't think it's me. I really think it's the fact that it's Scripture, that the melody then allows this incredibly important scriptural text to hit the heart in a way that it wouldn't, maybe, if you were just reading it."

Scripture is at the center of Joncas's creative process, even as his musical style ranges widely. The song is based on Psalm 91, its lyrics drawing from the Scripture's descriptions of God's protection and providence. Lyrics include the lines

*"You need not fear the terror of the night,
nor the arrow that flies by day,"* and

*"For to his angels he's given a command
to guard you in all of your ways."*

Although there are no mentions of eagles in Psalm 91, the song's chorus uses the metaphor to depict God's high, secure places the verse describes.

*"And he will raise you up on eagle's wings,
bear you on the breath of dawn,
make you to shine like the sun,
and hold you in the palm of his hand."*

The song's colorful imagery is woven together by a melody with airy highs and a crescendo refrain. The verses were meant to be sung by a cantor capable of handling the wide range of notes. Congregants would join in singing the simpler chorus. Something else happened, though. "I have been amazed to find congregations sing the entire thing."

We look forward to singing with you next month!

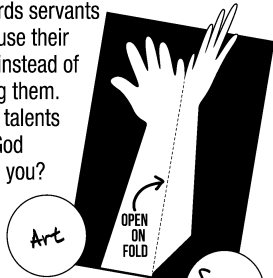

COUNCIL MINUTES September 14, 2021

The September 14th meeting of the St. Peter's Lutheran Church council meeting was called to order by President James Rittmeyer at 6:35 pm. This meeting was held in the sanctuary so social distancing can be observed. In attendance were: Bob Hagenow, Beth Hutchinson, Brad Larson, Tyson Miller, Calvin Moll, Keith Podoll, Barb Reddeman, Charlotte Reddeman, Alex Rehlinger, James Rittmeyer, Ben Robinson, Lynnette Taylor, Paul Yamriska, Jeremy Zieroth, and Kelly Pieper, Child Care Director.

Cantor Jeremy Zieroth led the opening devotion with a message from John 11. Jesus said "I am the Resurrection and the Life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die" (John 11:25-26a). We should have hope and trust that Jesus can always do something, even in cases of death. The agenda was presented. Additions were asked to be included under New Business: District Convention next summer 2022 and for Lynnette to provide an explanation of the insurance that St. Peter's offers its employees. Paul Yamriska moved approval with additions, Brad Larson provided the second, motion carried.

Secretary's minutes were read. Bob Hagenow asked that a correction be made to the Financial Secretary's report and delete the line that states "As of today we are at 80% of the budget" as that was recorded incorrectly in the notes, also to delete the statement from the Treasurer's report stating we had only budgeted \$350 per month for mileage. Keith Podoll asked for a correction to the amount that the heating part of the new unit downstairs as that came in at \$830 instead of \$500. Keith Podoll moved to approve the report with corrections, Brad Larson second, motion carried.

The Financial secretary's report was given by Bob Hagenow. We had contributions at 122% of the previous month for the general fund, 183% of the previous month for missions, and 94% of the previous month in the Special Purpose fund. The numbers show us at 86% of the prior year in the general fund (August 2020 compared to August 2021). August online giving accounted for 24% of the contributions to the general fund and 42% of the mission giving came from the online giving. Tyson Miller moved approval, Alex Rehlinger second, motion carried.

The Treasurer's report was given by Barb Reddeman. The current checkbook balance is \$11,829.14. This includes all bills on the report paid, two deposits and one payroll for the month of September. The Rock Solid bill came in for the heating part of the new unit downstairs and was \$830 which was split between the building fund and the PreK Building Use Fund. Barb then made mention of an estate bequest from James Dobratz. He has given us \$50,000 to be used in the downstairs "kitchen (including appliances, cabinets, lighting, plumbing, etc) and to update the bathrooms. Any amount remaining from this specific bequest after update of the kitchen and bathrooms shall be used at the discretion of the church's board of directors." Calvin Moll moved approval of the treasurer's report, Brad Larson second, motion carried.

The Elders report was presented by Calvin Moll. He stated that they are still in discussion about returning to the rail for communion in October. It was noted that there is no change to the military care committee as it still has three active members at this time. The Elders are continuing to revise the Usher lists. Cantor Jeremy Zieroth reported that choirs have begun and are through one week of practice for the new season. There are multiple choir packets available for anyone who

would like to join, see Jeremy to pick one of those up. The Sunday School choirs begin next week and the older group (grades 3-8) will sing at the 8:00 a.m. service on September 26th. He is keeping busy as there are two funerals coming up in the next two weeks.

The Trustees reported that they have not yet heard from Window World on installation dates but hopefully soon. After the declination letter from Pastor Beltz was read, it was determined that the finite points have been discussed among the council and we do have a plan going forward for doing the needed repairs to the Parsonage, therefore that letter was dismissed. The trustees are still waiting for replies from contractors about the siding, soffit and fascia, once those estimates are in hand and finances are secured for those projects, they will be completed.

The Board of Christian Education report was given by Charlotte Reddeman. She had briefly introduced the new Child Care Center director, Ms. Kelly Pieper to the Council. Kelly began on September 1st and is currently being trained by Connie Hendrickson who has been especially helpful during this time of transition. We thank her for that help and her agreement to continue to come in once a week to help with other questions as they arise. They conducted an exit interview with Tiffany Amoriello and got some good feedback. Sunday School began with Rally Sunday on September 12, 2021 with Lisa Hagenow and Cathy Schmidt teaching the younger grades (PreK -2) and Charlotte Reddeman teaching the upper grades (3-8). Midweek students received a letter from Pastor Hintz to let them know of the resumption of classes beginning Wednesday, September 15th. The Friday morning Bible Class is still going strong and the Sunday morning class with Pastor Hintz continues to grow and are still studying the Small Catechism

There was no Pastor's report as there have been no events prior to this meeting.

There were no membership changes.

Old business began with a call committee update. Bill Hageman has stepped down from the committee and Paul Yamriska is going to take his place. They are planning to meet tomorrow, September 15th to begin to look through the list of five names as well as potentially go back through what we were previously given.

New business began with discussion of the Quarterly Voters' meeting date. Bob Hagenow moved that we hold it between services on October 17th, Ben Robinson second, motion carried. President Rittmeyer indicated that Circuit Visitor Greg Hovland is sending information regarding next summers District Convention to him as we do not have a Pastor in place yet. There will be openings for nominations for office and Jim will bring those up at the Quarterly Meeting. Lynnette Taylor was then asked to explain what St. Peter's offers by way of insurance. She explained "The Church's Plan" that St. Peter's is part of through Concordia Plan Services. Bob Hagenow offered to get together with her to compare insurance packages to make sure that St. Peter's is still offering the best option for it's church workers and employees.

Calvin Moll moved to adjourn the meeting at 7:44 p.m., Keith Podoll second, motion carried. The Lord's prayer was recited. Elder meeting follows.
