


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ST. PETER'S NET

DECEMBER 2021

Our Lord Jesus Christ, the great physician of both body and soul, healed a man with dropsy by His Word on the Sabbath (Luke 14:1–6). Dropsy is a paradoxical ailment, with an unquenchable craving for drink even though the body is over inflated with fluid, a craving that, when indulged, served not to ease but to feed the disease.

And so, if a man drinks a great deal but is never filled, he sees a doctor to inquire about what ails him, what is wrong with his body, and how to remedy it. For that is not thirst but a disease (Seneca, *Consolation to His Mother Helvia*, 11.3).

But if the owner of five couches goes looking for 10, or the owner of 10 tables buys up as many again, and even though he has plenty of land and money, he remains unsatisfied and desires yet more, losing sleep and always in discontent, does he not also require a physician to diagnose the cause of this distress?

For this is not want or lack, it's a disease (Aristippus, quoted in Plutarch, *Love of Wealth*, 524b). As St. Augustine of Hippo wrote, "we may rightly compare the dropsical man to a covetous rich man: For the more the one is swollen with excess of water, the more he thirsts; so also the other: The more he abounds in riches ... the more eagerly he desires them" (*The Sunday Sermons of the Great Fathers*, 4:135). Both require physicians. Both require diagnosis and medicine applied from the outside to the inward be-

ing. For these are not desires to be fulfilled but diseases to be cured.

This is why our Lord instructs us to not to be consumed by money. "No one can serve two masters ... You cannot serve God and money" (Matt. 6:24; Luke 16:13). Our desire for money, like the disease dropsy, is never satisfied. We always desire more. We think, "If I just had this much then I would be happy."

But even when that much comes, which God gladly gives, happiness evades us. The desire for more is never satisfied. It demands our constant energy, either in procuring more or protecting what we already have. When this happens, God, in His mercy, shows us that the money that He has given is no longer serving us, but we it. We have another master.

To overcome this, we need a physician's diagnosis and a physician's remedy. And our Lord Jesus Christ, our great physician of both body and soul, applies His Word to us as He did to the man healed of dropsy. He shows us how we have put our fear, love, and trust in our money and not feared, loved, and trusted in Him above all things.

In essence, He says, "Stop chasing after these fleeting things. They are vanity. They are the things that moth and rust destroy. You cannot have two masters. Repent!" And in seeing our great error, we are sorry that we have not fully feared, loved, and trusted in God above all things. And, in the mercy and grace that He earned for us on the

cross, He takes away this sin, restores us to health, and bids us to live.

But then what? What do we do with this healing balm and care that our great physician has given? Do we simply go back to our old ways? "By no means!" St. Paul says (Rom. 3:31; 6:2). We do not just go back to the old ways, the ways that lead us to death. No, we live a new life, a life filled with the grace, mercy and love of God toward us. And God's great mercy, grace, and love toward is so abundant that it overflows and pours out onto those around us.

So we no longer hoard money and possessions. We no longer scrape and crawl our way to amass more. We give to those around us, as God in Christ has given to us. We press our money and possessions into service for those who need it: our family, our society and our church. For money is God's gift to us to serve us and others. Not the other way around. It serves us because it is a gift from our Father in heaven

For this month's hymn study, we look at the ever popular, but very traditional hymn, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" (LSB #357). This hymn, as usual, is the hymn of the day for Advent 4. This year it is December 19/20.

We are lousy at waiting in 21st century America. From the plethora of fast-food choices, to TV "on demand", to our smartphone eliminating nearly every opportunity for boredom, to same-day pickup, we seldom have to

wait for anything. Our lives sprint from one engaging activity to another so much so that the idea of anticipation has become for us the most unusual of all spiritual disciplines.

This is one reason why we've lost some of the wonder of one of the greatest Advent hymns of all time, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel". The hymn presupposes the spiritual truth that waiting is not only necessary at times, it is also beneficial. There can be no faith without anticipation. God's people have always understood this...they were forced to. The great narratives in scripture give us the exciting highlights, but if you read in-between the lines you'll find that

most of salvation history is about waiting.

The hymn is based upon the Great "O" Antiphons of Advent— seven ancient scriptural prayers of waiting (a translation is provided in the Lutheran Service Book, 357). One antiphon was traditionally sung each day from December 17th to the 23rd. The opening stanza in modern hymnals is in fact the last antiphon to be prayed, "O Emmanuel, our king and our Lord, the anointed for the nations and their Savior: come and save us, O Lord our God." The seven antiphons, originally prayed or sung in Latin, retained their popularity even into the reformation period. For example, English reformer and dramatist John Bale (1495-1563) structured a seven-part Reformation drama called "God's Promises" upon them—so they have a long, rich and diverse history in the church.

Each Antiphon consists of a title given to Christ in the Old Testament and a petition asking him to come and fulfill a scriptural promise or prophecy. There is a beautiful logic to them They begin in the remote vastness of the Eternal Wisdom (stanza 2 in our hymnals) continue through Moses and the Law, remembering David and his promised descendant who would rule Israel gloriously. They pass through the Babylonian captivity and the conviction of the later prophets that the Messiah was to be more than an

earthly king, declaring that he would be King and Savior of all people, and even more, proclaiming him Emmanuel, God with us. You will notice that the antiphons proceed on an ascending scale of excitement, reaching a crescendo as they usherin the joy of the Feast of the Nativity. But in each antiphon, we return to the theme of waiting. They are prayers that God would come and teach, redeem, deliver, rescue, enlighten, save, and dwell with His people. These petitions are only possi-

ble for people who wait—who understand that God's promises in Christ are always now, but not yet; here, but still coming. It's a discipline we would do well to rediscover. Immersing ourselves in these ancient prayers will not only build-up our faith, it might actually slow us down in this busy time of year. Blessings on your Advent. May you keep Christ as the center of your Advent and Christmas worship. See you in church!



COUNCIL MINUTES November 9, 2021

The November 9th meeting of the St. Peter's Lutheran Church council meeting was called to order by President James Rittmeyer at 6:49 pm. This meeting was held in the sanctuary so social distancing can be observed. In attendance were: Bob Hagenow, Connie Hendrickson, Beth Hutchinson, Brad Larson, Bill Manthey, Tyson Miller, Calvin Moll, Keith Podoll, Charlotte Reddeman, Alex Rehlinger, James Rittmeyer, Daniel Schmidt, Lynnette Taylor, Paul Yamriska, and Geremy Zieroth.

Pastor David Juhl, his wife Becky, and children, Catherine, Matthew, Christopher, Timothy, and Bethany were introduced to the members of the council. We spent a few minutes learning some background about them and then went around and introduced ourselves to the visiting Pastor's family. Cantor Geremy Zieroth led the opening devotion with a message from Hymn 508, "The Day Is Surely Drawing Near". With its sobering imagery and words of warning for all who would ignore, neglect or reject God and His gracious plan of salvation, this hymn helps us sing with calm confidence in God's promise of salvation by simple faith in Christ and reliance on His Word and grace. In this faith we remain vigilant and ready for our Lord's return and the culmina-tion of our deliverance from sin, the devil and death.

The agenda was presented. Dan Schmidt moved approval, Bob Hagenow provided the second, motion carried.

Secretary's minutes were read. Bob Hagenow moved to approve the report, Calvin Moll second, motion carried.

The Financial Secretary's report was given by Bob Hagenow. We had a solid October with contributions at 125% of the previous month for the general fund, 119% of the previous month for missions, but again October had five Sundays whereas September was a four week month. The numbers show us at 87% of the prior year in the general fund and 91% of the prior year in mission giving. October online giving accounted for 9% of the contributions to the general fund and 13% of the mission giving. Calvin Moll moved approval, Keith Podoll second, motion carried.

The Treasurer's report was given by Lynnette Taylor. The current checkbook balance on November 9th is \$14,522.87. This includes all bills on the report paid, one deposit so far but no payroll yet for the month of November. It was noted that the Mission fund was only \$324.30 from the pledge being met and that had already been contributed in November. Dan Schmidt moved approval of the treasurer's report, Brad Larson second, motion carried.

The Elders report was presented. Military Care indicated that six cards were being sent out for Veteran's Day. They are getting Christmas cards to send out to each of their list of members of the congregation and it will include the schedule of our Christmas services. The Christian Women's Council is doing their pie sales again although only pumpkin this year due to the low apple supplies, orders due to the church office by November 17th. The luncheon at Calvary went very well, they served about 15 students on Sunday but were able to leave the meal items (a Mexican buffet and many desserts from members of St. Peter's) for use at Calvary's Wednesday service as well. Cantor Geremy Zieroth reported that all choirs are going strong and have plans in place for the upcoming Advent/ Christmas season. In fact the children will begin practicing their Christmas songs this week.

The Trustees reported that the notice had come from Window World that the windows should be in to the company this week and when they arrive, the company will give us about a weeks notice as to when they will be here to install them. Many mentions were made as to how bright the cross is now that the neon has been changed to LED lights. They have received one bid for the siding, gutters, soffit, and fascia at the parsonage. All total with this bid it would be about \$35,208. They are



waiting on a contractor from Sun Prairie to put in a bid tomorrow and have contacted another company from Portage to see if they can get a bid from them also. Snow removal for the season has been contracted with Stoltenburg Painting again. Each snowfall event will be \$200 for plowing the lot and shoveling the walks. There was a mention of a small repair needed in the concrete by the garage door of the parsonage.

The Board of Christian Education report was given by Charlotte Reddeman. The Child Care Center enrollment is at 13 with another 10 who are wrap-around students (those who come for Preschool and then stay with us the rest of the day). We rejoice with Macie P., who was recently baptized here at St. Peter's along with her sister. The students took a trip to the fire station and held a Halloween party. The center is comparing rates with other facilities to be sure that we are in a competitive range. None of our High School Youth were able to participate in the Calvary Luncheon serving. Midweek classes are ongoing and will be taught by Cantor for the next two weeks while Pastor Hintz is away on vacation. The Bible study groups are still meeting.

The Pastor's report stated that there were four baptisms in the last two weeks.

There were no membership changes.

Old business was just a reiteration of who is on the Nominating Committee and the Budget Committee.

There was no New Business

Calvin Moll moved to adjourn the meeting at 7:1 p.m., Dan Schmidt second, motion carried. The Lord's prayer was recited. Elder meeting follows.
