Beloved in the Lord:

Happy New Year of Our Lord 2022! Thanks be to God that He has brought us together as fellow members of the body of Christ!

Here's my brief biography: I was born June 1, 1972 in Du Quoin, IL, some 400 miles south of Arlington on U.S. Highway 51. I was baptized on June 18, 1972 and confirmed on March 23, 1986 at Bethel Lutheran Church, Du Quoin, IL. I attended public schools in Du Quoin, then attended Junior College for two years before transferring to Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, IL, where I graduated in 1994 with a Bachelor's Degree in Radio-Television Broadcasting. The Lord has blessed us with three sons and two daughters.

I was installed on March 25, 2007 as Pastor of Our Savior Lutheran Church, Momence, IL. After nearly fifteen years of ministry in Momence, the Lord of the Church has brought me to Saint Peter Lutheran Church, Arlington, WI.

Now that I'm here, what's next? Only God knows the answer to that question. What I know is that I covet your prayers as I begin the ministry of the Gospel here. I also know that I will make a lot of mistakes. Please give me an extra measure of grace these first few months as I get to know you, and you get to know me.

They came from a distant land and traveled a difficult, dangerous way to find the King whose star they had seen in the East. Let us pray for the light of God's Word shine to forever shine in our hearts and be our guide, a well-lit path for all our days of joy as well as our days of sorrow.

Your Word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path. Psalm 119:105

The Wise Men rejoiced when they saw the star that would lead them to Jesus. So, too, God's Word will lift our spirits, give us strength and brighten our lives. May the joy found in His promises of forgiveness, redemption and glory be evident in each of us.

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. Romans 15:13

When the Wise Men reached the end of their journey and at last came to Jesus, they knelt down and worshiped Him. They had found the Savior of the world. They may not have known it, but they were the first Gentiles to come to faith in the Savior. They presented Him with their most precious gifts: gold, frankincense and myrrh.

What is the meaning of Epiphany? God has sent His Son to be the Savior for ALL people. So we are reminded that our gifts will help bring joyful word of that Savior to all people everywhere.

But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near through the blood of Christ. For he himself is our peace, who has made the two one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility, by abolishing in his flesh the law with its commandments and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new man out of the two, thus making peace, and in this one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility. Ephesians 2:13-16

After the Wise Men had worshiped Jesus, they were warned not to return to Herod, so they returned home another way. God's Word is the source of hope and wisdom for our lives. From His Word, we are called to repent of trusting in ourselves or despairing; His Word shows His faithfulness, that we may then cast our anxieties on the Lord. From God, the wise men had but a vision for their safety, and they believed. How much more have we received from the Lord for our eternal safety. *O Holy Spirit, put our feet on this other way, the path of trust.* For you have been born again, not of perishable seed, but of imperishable, through the living and enduring word of God. For, "All men are like grass, and all their glory is like the flowers of the field; the grass withers and the flowers fall,

but the word of the Lord stands forever." 1 Peter 1:23-25

# What's in a name?

As the U.S. evacuated thousands from Afghanistan in August 2021, an Afghan woman gave birth on a plane. She named her daughter Reach — the name of the aircraft that brought her family to safety.

Many people name their children after loved ones or special events; a child born on Christmas might be called Noel or Holly. In Bible times, too, names often had meanings: Eve likely means "mother of all living"; Abraham, "father of many"; Isaac, "laughter." Moses is a play on words with the Hebrew for "draw out" because Pharaoh's daughter drew him from the Nile.

Of course, the most important biblical name is Jesus, which means "The Lord saves." As the angel told Joseph, "[Mary] will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21, ESV). The Christian church traditionally celebrates Name of Jesus on January 1. But every day, as we pray in Jesus' name, we remember that what's in *this* name is the salvation God offers to all.

### COUNCIL MINUTES December 14, 2021

The December 14th meeting of the St. Peter's Lutheran Church council meeting was called to order by President James Rittmeyer at 6:40 pm. This meeting was held in the sanctuary so social distancing is observed.

Cantor Geremy Zieroth led the opening devotion from 1 Corinthians 4. Think of your employee handbook, it lists the things you are responsible for doing and also the consequences of forgetting those things. The Bible is like our employee handbook as it reminds us that we are a child of God and keeping His commandments are what we are responsible for. Fortunately for us, the consequences of forgetting those commandments have been graciously taken care of by Jesus Christ and we are forgiven because Jesus hung on the cross to relieve us of those consequences.

The agenda was presented. Two items were requested to be added as new business: Annual Voters' Meeting date and Christmas Gifts. Paul Yamriska moved approval, Brad Larson provided the second, carried.

Secretary's minutes were read. Bob Hagenow moved approval, Calvin Moll second, carried.

The Financial Secretary's report was given by Bob Hagenow. Contributions at 84% of the previous month for the general fund, 60% of the previous month for missions, reminding us that November was a four week month whereas October had five Sundays. The numbers show us at 87.5% of the prior year in the general fund and 91.1% of the prior year in mission giving. November online giving accounted for 9.9% of the contributions to the general fund and 27% of the mission giving. The Special Purpose Fund is at 181% of the prior year due to the various estate gifts that have been received. Brad Larson moved approval, Keith Podoll second, motion carried.

The Treasurer's report was given by Barbara Reddeman. The current checkbook balance on December 14<sup>th</sup> is \$14,606.36. This includes all bills on the report paid, two deposits so far and one payroll for the month of December. It was noted that the Mission fund pledge has been met and that further funds given to that account will be split half and half with the District. She noted that blinds have been ordered for the new parsonage windows. Greg Frank moved approval of the treasurer's report, Benjamin Robinson second, motion carried.

The Elders report was presented. Military Care indicated that two Christmas packages (a Wisconsin themed box with all things made in Wisconsin) have been sent to members who are out of state. Those members who are serving within the state are receiving Christmas cards. They reported that the return to the rail for communion has been received very well with many comments on how powerful it felt to be kneeling for communion again in the presence of the Lord. It was also noted that the new candelabra are absolutely beautiful. Cantor Geremy Zieroth says that "It is Christmas", and all things are being prepared for that special time of year. Both Sunday School groups are well on their way to having their programs prepared. There are twelve children preparing "Happy Birthday Jesus" as the younger SS grades program to be held Sunday, December 19<sup>th</sup> at 9:30 am. There are ten older children who are preparing "Arise and Shine" for the Carol Service on December 24<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 pm. Both the vocal and handbell choirs are also preparing special pieces for Christmas services.

The Trustees reported



that the new windows have been installed. They have received three bids for the siding, gutters, soffit, and fascia at the parsonage. Ridge Top Siding bid came in at \$35,208; The Gardner Company bid came in at \$22,980 with a bit more if we choose to use the premium siding (they can do it the Spring of 2022); and Ron's Home Improvement bid came in at \$21,700 (they are booked through until the spring of 2023 so that could change by the time they get here). Calvin Moll made the motion to contract with The Gardner Company. Barbara Reddeman second, motion carried. The repair on the garage floor of the parsonage also has a bid in and Burkhardt said he would do it for \$3,300 (cash price) and would probably have it done before the new year. Pastor Juhl then had a few requests from his family regarding the parsonage: 1. Plenty of outlets for the chest freezers in the garage; 2. Outlets in the basement for television and radio broadcast equipment; 3. Has the fireplace been checked and is it usable?.

The Board of Christian Education report was given by Charlotte Reddeman. The Child Care Center enrollment is at 14 with another 10 who are wrap-around students (those who come for Preschool and then stay with us the rest of the day). They will be raising their rates after the first of the year. The staff are also looking at increasing salaries. They are hosting a Christmas program on Wednesday, December 22 at 4:30 pm here in the sanctuary. The inside climbing gym has been donated to Kid's First in Poynette. The Sunday School programs are all practicing for Christmas on Saturdays this month with Superintendent Bob Hagenow organizing those practices. Midweek classes are meeting as usual but will be taking off for Christmas break Dec 22<sup>nd</sup> and December 29<sup>th</sup> and plan to meet again on January 5<sup>th</sup>. The Bible study groups are still meeting.

The Pastor's report stated that there are a number of upcoming services during the month of December. The Christian Women's Council has taken charge of organizing the reception for the Installation of Rev. David Juhl.

There were no membership changes.

There was no old business as neither the Budget or Nominating Committee's had anything to report.

New Business began with the options for holding our Annual Voters' Meeting in January. Greg Frank moved to hold it on Sunday, January 23, 2022 at 1:00 p.m., second was provided by Brad Larson, motion carried. President Rittmeyer then asked Geremy, Lynnette and Pastor Juhl to be excused so that the rest of the council could discuss Christmas.


There were no notes taken about the close of the meeting.




