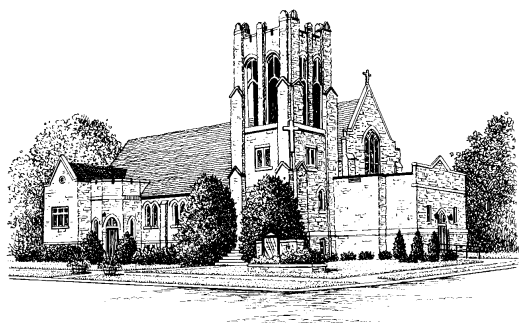

Beloved in the Lord:

April 10<sup>th</sup> begins the holiest week of the church year. If you've never attended all the services of Holy Week, this year is as good as any year to try. What are each of the Holy Week services like?

Palm Sunday has a twofold emphasis. First there is the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. Palm branches are strewn in His way as the King of Kings appears in the holy city ready to suffer and die for the sins of the world. The emphasis quickly changes to one of sorrow as we hear a portion of Saint Matthew's passion account. Although the mood is sorrowful, there is a thread of joy as we hear Jesus atoning for our sins. The Lamb of God, now slain, has accomplished what His Father sent Him to do for our sake.

Maundy Thursday begins the Paschal Triduum. Think of Maundy Thursday as the beginning of a three-day service that continues Good Friday and concludes with the Easter Vigil (a service that, God willing, will be reintroduced on Holy Saturday, 2023). Maundy Thursday is when we hear the mandate (the "maundy") to love one another as Christ first loved us. No greater

love does Christ give to us than in the institution of His Supper, where He gives us His very Body and Blood to eat and drink for the forgiveness of sins. The rite of First Communion takes place during this Divine Service as some of our catechumens will receive the Lord's Supper for the first time. The altar is stripped after the Lord's Supper while Psalm 22 is sung and we leave in silence as our Lord begins His suffering for your sake.

Good Friday is truly a good day. That sounds odd when you hear Saint John's passion account and the hymns are solemn and grave. Yet think of Good Friday this way: the work of your salvation is accomplished in Christ Jesus shedding His blood for your sake. His perfect life and His all-availing sacrifice for the sins of the world take center stage on Good Friday. Though Christ's heel is bruised, as the Lord God promised the serpent in Genesis chapter three, the devil's head is crushed. Jesus Christ has paid your debt of sin in full. Good Friday indeed!

We return Easter Sunday to celebrate Christ's triumphant victory over the grave. Jesus lives! The victory is won! Because He lives, you also will live for all

eternity! Death has no dominion over you because Jesus Christ has trampled down death forever. Together we laugh to scorn the gloomy grave and rejoice in being in Christ's presence forever. Sacrifice the time to be in the house of the Lord for all of Holy Week. Come hear your salvation in sermon, song, and sacrament as you hear Jesus Christ suffer, die, and rise again for you.

## Music Ministry



### A WALK THROUGH THE LITURGY: The INTROIT

As we continue to walk through the divine service, we move on to the Introit. What is an introit? I am ever so thankful for the work of The Commission on Worship of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod in producing the most recent Lutheran Service Book. It is spectacular. The book is a great resource and really should be purchased for home devotions. It contains so many great things, not just hymns! It contains a wonderful glossary of terms, too.

In that little glossary on page xxiv we find the definition for the word introit. The word comes from the Latin, meaning to enter. An introit is a collection of psalm verses sung or spoken at the beginning of the service. It is what is known as part of the Propers for the day and is the first one of the day. What is a proper, you ask? What a perfect time to learn.

The Divine Service has two parts to it: Ordinaries and Propers. We've look at two pieces of ordinaries already: Confession and Absolution and the Kyrie. Ordinaries are pieces of the service that are pretty much the same. You could say that they are Ordinarily there! The settings may word them differently, but each piece in each setting serves the same purpose. The other Ordinaries are: the Gloria, the Alleluia, the Offertory, the Sanctus, the Agnus Dei, the Nunc Dimittis/ Post-communion canticle, and the Benediction. It's easy to tell them apart because they are printed out in the liturgy part of the hymnal!

The other portion is the Propers. These are not printed in the hymnal liturgy because they change every week! The other propers include the Collect of the Day, the Readings, the Hymns, and the Sermon.



The Introit plays a pretty important part in setting the tone for the rest of the Divine Service. It is the first words we hear that begin to develop the theme of the day. Why is it called the Introit? Well, historically speaking the pastors or bishops of the early church would go from house church to house church. Upon entering the church, they would begin singing the psalm and take up their place at the altar. This is still a practice in some churches. At St. Peter's, we do not begin the service from the back of the church, but it is during the Introit that Pastor first approaches the altar.

This singing of the Introit also begins what is called the Service of the Word, for the Word of God is central to the event taking place. The Introit then is a key aspect of the Divine Service further preparing us and conditioning us to tune our ears in to the themes of the upcoming readings, hymns, and sermon as well.

I encourage you to take time to study the introit upon arrival. If you want to know what's coming up on future Sundays, that is also available in the hymnal. Turn to pages xx-xxi and see the entire year's worth of readings. May they help prepare you for hearing Jesus proclaimed. For you.

Greetings from Fort Wayne! My reason for writing to you is twofold. First, I want to thank you as my home congregation for supporting me as I attend seminary. Your prayers, encouragement, and financial gifts go a long way. Thank you especially to the Lutheran Christian Women's Council for the generous check you wrote to support my efforts as I prepare for pastoral ministry. I was delighted to receive your letter in the midst of a hectic week of classes. This truly helps me stay focused on class work rather than feeling obligated to split my time between classes and a part-time job. The education is so rich here that I feel abundantly blessed to focus my efforts on classes and absorb as much of the content as possible before being ordained and taking my first call. Your support helps me do this.

I also want to give you an update on my own progress here. I recently started my third quarter and am deep in the books. I did not realize it when I began classes, but I am taking 3 or 4 credits more than the average quarter course-load. I am, however, very excited about what I am studying. Two highlights so far are my Catechetics class and my Church History III class. Church History III is covering the time shortly after the Reformation, and I have been blown away by the readings and discussions so far. Rather than being a stagnant history class, we consistently delve deep into the theological discussions that the Lutherans were having with the Roman Catholic and Reformed churches at that time. If anything, reading their works is very humbling for me because these writers lived, breathed, and knew God's Word by heart. They were in the heat of doctrinal controversy, and every one of them sought to defend the faith with Scripture as their weapon.

I also recently made plans to be a summer vicar at my parents' home congregation in Arizona. I'm really looking forward to the experience, and I see it as an opportunity for me to grow. The congregation is much different than the congregations in which I grew up. Rather than it being rural, it is a large church with three pastors and is located downtown. The senior pastor is very generous by giving my brother (who will also be vicaring there) and me several preaching opportunities throughout the summer.

You and your ministry are in my thoughts and prayers. I also thank the Lord for calling Pastor Juhl to St. Peter's, and for the opportunity to meet him for the first time a few weeks ago.

Many blessings to you, and I hope to visit you again in the near future.

Create this craft to share the events of Holy Week with a younger sibling or friend.

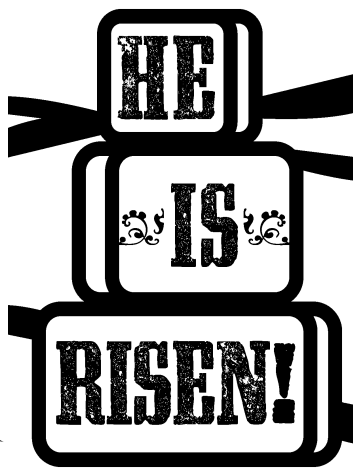


## What you need:

- Clear bottle or jar with lid
- White rice
- Small items that symbolize Holy Week events

## What you do:

1. Pour rice into bottle or jar so it's about two-thirds full.
2. Add the small items. Ideas: leaf, donkey, cup, towel square, praying hands, coin, bird, nails, thorn, cross, dice, stick, lamb, stone, white fabric.
3. Fasten the lid. Then shake and turn the bottle to "spy" each item.

## What you need:

- 3 wood blocks (small, medium, large)
- Acrylic paint (three pastel colors and white)
- Paintbrush
- Water
- Paper towels
- Letter stencils and tape (optional)

## What you do:

1. Paint each block of wood a different pastel color. (You can paint the whole block or just one side.)
2. When paint is dry, use white paint to write (or stencil) "He" on the smallest block, "is" on the medium block and "risen!" on the large block.
3. When blocks are dry, stack them from largest to smallest to proclaim "He is risen!"

## COUNCIL MINUTES February 8, 2022

The March 8th meeting of the St. Peter's Lutheran Church council meeting was called to order by President James Rittmeyer at 6:31 pm.

Pastor Juhl gave the opening devotion with a message given by Nathan Medor at the circuit forum from Jeremiah 29. This letter that Jeremiah wrote was intended for the exiles into Babylon. They knew they deserved what they faced but wanted to know how long it would be. God's instruction to His people was to settle in Babylon and not expect to return immediately to their homeland. They were to settle down and build houses. They were to plant gardens, get married, have children, and even look forward to their grandchildren. They were to live quiet lives in Babylon and contribute to the welfare of the city and the well-being of its citizens. And they were instructed to live prayerful lives. Much the same way that we are today. We are to make our community a better place by living in faithfulness. We may not make much of a difference in the world but by living prayerfully we will make a difference in our community.

President Rittmeyer took a few minutes to explain that he had attended the circuit forum with Pastor Juhl the last week of February. He reported that as of right now the South Wisconsin District is looking at adding two mission churches – one in Fall River, WI and one in Platteville, WI.

The agenda was presented. President Rittmeyer asked that we add to new business the ratification of Tyson Miller to serve another term as Elder. Michael Hendrickson moved approval with the addition, Steve Paskey second, motion carried.

Secretary's minutes were read. Bob Hagenow moved to approve the report, Brad Larson second, motion carried.

The Financial Secretary's report was given by Bob Hagenow. February proved to be another solid month. 135% of the previous year for general fund in February and 126% of the previous year for missions giving. Online giving in February was 9.5% of the total giving to general fund and 14.5% of the mission giving. Year to date general fund is 164% over the previous year and missions are at 126% of previous year. The Special Purpose fund has been blessed with large estate bequests in both the previous year as well as this current year. March's first weeks deposits were very solid and Bob reminded the group that it also included the Ash Wednesday giving which is split half and half between current expenses and mission fund. Benjamin Robinson moved approval of Financial Secretary's report, Bill Manthey second, motion carried.

The Treasurer's report was given by Meg Hanson. The current checkbook balance is \$19,439.53. This includes all bills on the report paid, one deposit but no payroll yet this month. She asked the Council for permission to transfer money from the heat fund in Special Purpose to help with the \$1700.00 February heat bill. Bob Hagenow moved approval of the transfer, Michael Hendrickson second, motion carried. Meg then asked for permission to use the Thanksgiving Funds to purchase books for the adult confirmation class being held at this time. Benjamin Robinson moved approval as having people want to join our church is definitely something to be thankful for, Michael Hendrickson second, motion carried. Charlotte Reddeman moved approval of the treasurer's report, Keith Podoll second, motion carried.

The Elders report was presented. Military Care indicated that at this time all servicemen who were deployed have returned to the US. Altar Guild has been blessed with Cameron Gramse taking on the changing of the paraments. The outreach service project held at Calvary Lutheran Chapel was very well attended with five of our Elders helping to serve and clean up. They estimated that they fed 25 students. A request was made to reimburse Alex and Katie for the meal supplies and it was

agreed that the Outreach fund in Special Purpose was appropriate for that event. The Christian Women's Council will be holding a meeting on Saturday, March 19<sup>th</sup> at 9:00 am. A lead for the Easter Egg Hunt is needed, Brad Larson volunteered to take on that task.

The Elders all have a congregation list and have been calling on members as well as sending out Lent services schedule on a postcard. Cantor Jeremy Zieroth stated that all the choirs are back on schedule and we even have some instrumentalists for upcoming services.

The Trustees reported that the narthex bathroom is getting updates including an inline hot water heater so there is actually hot water there for washing up. Bill Manthey has put in an estimate for removing the wall paper and painting. The Trustees are looking for a crew to paint the sanctuary. William Thurston will be mowing the church lawn this summer. JW Lawn Care will be taking over the fertilization of our lawns (different branch of the company who did it previously). They are looking for volunteers to help clean up the landscaping this spring.

The Board of Christian Education report was given by Charlotte Reddeman. The Child Care Center current enrollment is at 25 with another child starting in April. They are in a solid financial state. Chapel began on Tuesday and will continue on Tuesdays for the time being. Young Star was here and performed their evaluation and the Child Care Center is please to announce that they received a 3-Star rating up from a 2-Star previously. Kelly Pieper had a director's assessment and received a 14 out of 15. The CCC has also been the recipient of two grants this spring that they will be using to purchase new equipment for large motor skill development. The Sunday School classes have 12 students in the upper grades and 17 in the lower grades. Two high school students: Piper Johnson and Georgia Cuff will begin helping out with the younger grades. Midweek classes are meeting as usual on Wednesdays and Pastor Juhl will finalize the dates for confirmation and first communion later tonight with the Elders. The Sunday Morning Bible study groups are studying the book of Philippians. The Men's Bible Study has moved to Saturday mornings at 8am and have gained a couple new members. The adult confirmation class being held on Thursday evenings has four people that are interested in becoming new members as well as a large handful of current members who are sitting in for the refresher.

The Pastor's report began with Pastor Juhl giving us the average attendance for the months of January (63) and February (116) for an average total of 90 which is up from the numbers of the previous two years. He performed a wedding for Christopher Karn and Stacey Fait on February 22<sup>nd</sup>. Pastor Juhl let us know that Pastor Hovland has been elected the circuit visitor and will serve a 3-year term. There will be a calendar put up in the narthex after Easter for all families in the congregation to sign up for a time when Pastor Juhl can come to meet them, an informal and voluntary way for him to get to know you. Women's Bible Study is looking to restart after Easter as well, more details will follow.

Steve Paskey made the motion to accept the transfer in of Rebecca Juhl, Catherine, Matthew, Christopher, Timothy, and Bethany Juhl from Our Savior Lutheran (LCMS), Momence, IL. Brad Larson provided the second, motion carried. Keith Podoll made a motion to accept the transfer out of Bill, Kelly, Justin Hageman, and Lauren Lokensgard to St. John's Lutheran (LCMS) Portage, WI. Benjamin Robinson second, motion carried.

There was no old business.





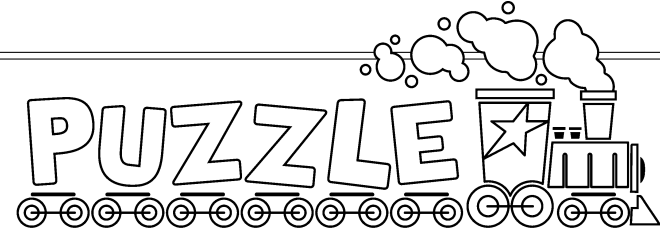

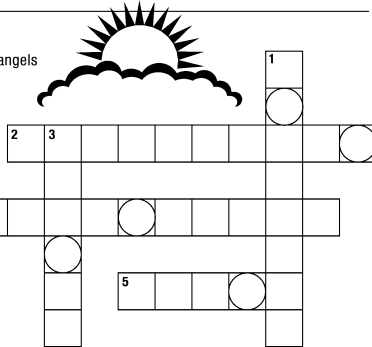
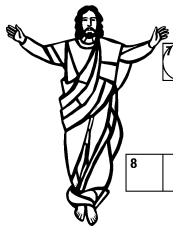
