

Beloved in the Lord:

Vicar and I recently attended a district convocation on rural and small town ministry. We learned there are two adjectives that best describe many Lutheran congregations in rural and small town settings (and all settings, for that matter): "small" and "struggling". I have previ-

ously served two congregations, one in a rural setting and the other in a small town setting. Both were small and struggling. Our congregation is not necessarily small and struggling, yet we face similar challenges as other Lutheran congregations near us.

How do we face the challenges set before us? We face them with resilience. Resilience is the ability to adapt to stressors of all sorts, to be able to rebound after suffering through adversity, setbacks, and a wide array of stressful circumstances.

The last several years have been challenging not just for our congregation, but for all congregations, no matter the denomination. The challenges have caused some congregations to close and oth-

ers have combined ministries with similar congregations. Three of our sister congregations in the Madison area are working together for Advent and Lent midweek services and other fellowship activities. That's resilience. They are not mourning what they once had, but working together for the sake of God's kingdom.

What about our resilience at the corner of Park and Ellickson Streets? The best way to practice resilience is to consider the words of Hebrews chapter twelve: "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to

Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted."

**Resilience is looking to Jesus**. We embrace hope, not a naive hope, but a sure and certain hope in response to all difficulties. We

work *with* each other, not *against* each other. The Lord fights *for* us, not *against* us. He's by our side upon the plain with His good gifts and Spirit.

Before we lament again about "the good old days", remember that we still live in "the good old days". Jesus has not left us as orphans. Jesus continues to forgive our sins and give us eternal life in Word and Sacraments. Our heavenly Father continues to give us opportunities to tell the Good News about Jesus to people who are dying to live. Look to Jesus. He will never take His eyes off us. Jesus is resilient unto death to give us the crown of everlasting life.

# "Music, Ministry



"Thee Will I Love, My Strength, My Tower" (LSB 694)

This month, let us look at a hymn for the 18th Sunday after Trinity, which occurs this year on October 15/16. The Old Testament and Gospel reading for this day both include the summary of the commandments, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart." Therefore, this hymn is a wonderful fit for such a set of readings!

At first, the language of this hymn seems to be about MY fervent love of Jesus, a kind of "You Are My Sunshine" song. However, to the Christian who knows the words of Jesus, it's a strong reflection on the relationship between "light" and "life." The "light of the world" is Jesus and Jesus is the one who gives me new "life." No Jesus, no new life— just the old rebellious self. The poet, Johann Scheffler (1624-1677), at the end of the first stanza makes reference to this connection between light and life ("Thee will I love, O light divine, so long as life is mine") and then repeats the same thought in the closing stanza.

Scheffler, an enthusiast for mystic poets, sought to reach for the Infinite and a sense of oneness between Creator and creature. This hymn, not surprisingly then, reminds today's singer of what was said in the opening to John's gospel about Jesus, the "Word," through whom all things were made: "In [Jesus] was life, and the life was the light of men" (John 1:4).

Scheffler rightly associates life with light and the "divine Light" is his central poetic image. Indeed, in stanza three Jesus is called the "Sun from heaven, whose radiance hath brought light to me." For this I give thanks because Jesus' lips (in German: "golden mouth") revealed the Father's love; because Jesus gave up his life for me, I am "glad and free."

The poet develops the light image in various ways. Sadly, since not everything comes through in translation, permit some reference to his original wording. In the German of the

1st stanza Scheffler says he loves the "strength" (vigor, intensity) and the "powerful affect" of this light (the translator's paraphrase says it gives me "hope" and "joy"). In the second stanza Jesus is "my life" (cf. John 1:4) and "truest friend." Then in the second part of this stanza where Scheffler's Ger-



man text had three Biblical images for Jesus, namely, that Jesus' "splendor" (brightness) enlightens a believer, that Jesus is the sacrificial "Lamb of God," and that Jesus is the "bridegroom" of the church, the translator settled for a single summarizing word, "Redeemer." In either version the language makes clear that Christian life is sourced in Jesus.

Since Christian life is enlivened by the radiance of the Light, stanza four prays for its power. Scheffler's original German asks Jesus to "keep me" on the narrow path, from straying in the wrong direction, and from stepping in the wrong places. It also prays for Jesus' heavenly "brightness" to enlighten my "life and soul." Finally, in stanza five Jesus is my "Crown" and, in times of greatest need and at my death, the "Light Divine" will always be my "God." The poetry concludes with a statement of trust.

Since the Light, Jesus, is the source of my life, everything that he does for me causes me to love, praise, and thank him. I recall Jesus' words: "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (John 8:12). When I sing this hymn it becomes my song of trust in Jesus, who enlightens me and gives me life.

Scheffler wrote many hymns and poems over his days. His poetry has a heavy slant to the mystic end of Roman Catholicism. His hymns, on the other hand, are very Christocentric, and used more in the Protestant churches than in Catholic churches today. He has one other text still included found at LSB 688, "Come, Follow Me, The Savior Spake". The tune ICH WILL DICH LIEBEN is attributed to Johann Balthasar Konig (1691-1758). He was music director in Frankfurt, Germany. He is best known for his book, *Harmonischer Liedenschatz*, a hymnal of 1913 melodies collected and arranged in one place. From this book, we still have tunes in use today: "All Depends on Our Posessing", "O That I Had a Thousand Voices", "By Grace I'm Saved", "Jesus Grant that Balm and Healing" are just a few of the titles associated with his melodies.

May the background and study of this hymn bless your faith in our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ! May he also ever be your strength and tower!

On the 12th of October 1810, King Ludwig I of Bavaria married Princess Therese of Saxe-Hildburghausen. Royal weddings in those days, were really only enjoyed by nobility and those of high social standing. However, King Ludwig and Princess Therese did something against the royal norm. They invited the

citizens of Munich, the capital of Bavaria, to attend the nuptial festivities on the meadows in front of the city gates. The locals gladly accepted the invitation and dressed formally for the event, the men wearing *Tirolerhüte* or Bavarian feathered-hats and women wearing fine dresses. There for the next few days, everyone, both royalty and commoner alike, enjoyed in a grand old time of horse races, oompah-bands, and, most importantly, beer brewed especially for that event. This wedding reception was such a hit that the people of Bavaria had to repeat it the following year and the year after that and then the year after that and so on. That party is still held annually in Bavaria (now in modern-

day Germany), and is known as "Oktoberfest." To this day, the party is held outside of Munich on the same meadows, called the *Theresienwiese* (literally "Therese's Meadow") or simply

"Theresienwiese (literally "Therese's Meadow") or simply the Wiesn. To this day, all are invited, including those from all

over the world. To this day, oompah-bands can be heard. To this day, specially-brewed Oktoberfest-style beer is served to quench the thirst of party-goers (with about 977,436.85 gallons or three Olympic swimming pools of beer consumed each year).

Just like how King Ludwig and Princess Therese invited their citizen-children to the party, so Christ through His Church invites us His children from all over the globe to partake of the marriage feast in the divine service. Christ even supplies the wedding garments, covering our sins by His death upon the Cross. And instead of pretzels and beer which leave a person still hungry, the Marriage Feast of the Lamb serves Christ's Body and Blood in, with, and under bread and wine for the forgiveness of sins. And although Bavarian Oktoberfest has changed (and arguably has lost sight of why it exists), the gift of Word and Sacrament are the same today as they were yesterday. To this day, the Word and Sacraments are still as needful as they were back then. Come join us at St. Peter's where this wedding feast is continually celebrated every Sunday morning and Monday night. Until then, God bless and Ein Prosit der Gemütlichkeit.





### **COUNCIL MINUTES** September 12, 2023

The September 12<sup>th</sup> meeting of the St. Peter's Lutheran Church council meeting was called to order by President Cameron Gramse at 6:30 pm. Pastor Juhl opened with a devotion from Galatians 5 & 6. No one can bear their own load alone, we all bear one another's burdens in the Lord. When we all carry them together it is a much lighter load.

The Agenda was presented. Brad Larson asked that we put an awareness of Michael Hendrickson's need for funds for room, board, and books at the Sem. Paul Yamriska moved approval with addition, Brad Larson second, motion carried.

Secretary's minutes were read. Bill Steffenhagen moved to approve report, Dan Schmidt second, carried.

Financial Secretary's report was read by Lynnette Taylor. August was a soft month with the general expense offerings coming in at 12,973 over the 4 Sundays. This was down from 14,310 we took in from 5 Sundays of July and down from 15,075 dollars taken in over 4 Sundays in August of 2022. Year to date, we stand at 98.6% of the prior year for general expense offerings and at 90.1% of our "budget" of predicted expenses through August. Missions are 117% of where we were last year and 164% of what we "budgeted". This August was 101% of last August and 83% of July (remember 5 Sundays in July and 4 this August). Significant special purpose offerings in August included 12,693 coming in for the Vicar Fund and 3480 for stain glass window repairs. 5,920 of the Vicar fund total (47%) came in via the online service. August online was 7% for general expense offering; 9.8% for mission offerings. One special note is that the insurance proceeds from Grinnell Mutual for the various roof repairs are accounted for in the transfer section of the August 2023 summary. August has traditionally been a softer month for our general expense offerings, and we have had several special accounts that are presently being supported (window repair and vicar). September through December have traditionally been stronger months for financial support of the congregation. Meg Hanson moved approval, Dan Schmidt second, car-

Treasurer's report was given by Meg Hanson. There was one large payment made to Kessenichs for half payment of the dishwasher, as of yesterday the second half has been paid as well. The dishwasher has been delivered to the church and is awaiting installation. The current checkbook balance is \$10,933.95. Bill Steffenhagen moved to approve, Phil Kruger second, carried.

Board of Elder's report was given by Alex Rehlinger. He mentioned that Sundays are going very smooth and they appreciate having the Vicar and thanked him for his work done to date. October 8<sup>th</sup> is the day that we will serve the luncheon for Calvary Lutheran Chapel. Sign up sheets will be up soon for desserts and helpers. There is no news from the Military Care Committee or the CWC. Cantor's report began with the news that summer is over so the new music season has begun. Hand bell choir and vocal choir will all begin practicing tomorrow, September 13<sup>th</sup> and the Sunday School choirs begin this coming weekend as well. The Sunday School choirs will do all their monthly singing during service at 8:00 am this year.

Trustee's Report was given by Greg Frank. The new dishwasher has been delivered and is awaiting installation. A contractor is currently working on repairs to the roofs of the vicarage, parsonage and church. Our church insurance coverage will be changing next fall as the company we are currently using no longer wants to insure buildings such as ours as they are very expensive to replace. The Trustees are working with the Child Care Center director and the insurance agent to get the wording correct for the signage for the playground.

Board of Christian Education report was given by Charlotte Reddeman. President Cameron Gramse thanked Charlotte for taking on the role of Sunday School Superintendent. The Child Care Center has hired Jordan Rittmeyer as a new lead teacher full time for the daycare. Enrollment at this time is 25 with a list of 14 requests for



child care for 2024 and 2025. Director Cathy Wendt is investigating the CACFP (Child and Adult Care Food Program) to see if it a feasible program for our center. Padlocks and chains have been purchased for the playground gates and signage wording is being finalized. Charlotte is going to acknowledge Cathy's one year anniversary on September 13<sup>th</sup>. Sunday School has kicked off and they have a schedule of lessons but there are three Sundays with no lesson so those have been designated as fun days and Charlotte is looking into having entertainment of some sort those days. Bible Studies are going well: Men are studying Genesis on Saturday mornings, Ladies are studying Proverbs, and Vicar has Sunday mornings with the minor prophets. Midweek classes begin, September 13<sup>th</sup>.

Pastor's Report: He had one official acts, a Baptism for Luca Keith Lochner on September 9th. He is visiting 6 Homebound member households. In the Madison North and South Circuit Rev. Matthew Lane of Peace, Faribault, MN is deliberating the call to Calvary Chapel, Madison and Living Christ, Madison, remains in the call process for a new sole pastor. Looking ahead, Vicar Sinatra is assisting him with most of the daily tasks, including an additional chapel service with the preschool on Thursday morning. We'll hear him preach again later this month as we work toward a regular preaching rotation. Pastor and Vicar will be away September 18-19 for a Rural and Small Town Ministry conference in Manitowoc. Pastor Sorenson from St. Paul, Madison will be our guest preacher on September 18<sup>th</sup>. They'll also be away on October 23-25 for the district pastors conference in Wisconsin Dells. There will be no Monday night Divine Service on October 23rd

Vicar Report was given by Vicar Nicholas Sinatra. He has taken on the responsibility of preparing and leading the prayers for the Divine Service as well as chanting both the Introit and Kyrie. He is set to preach September 24<sup>th</sup>, October 8<sup>th</sup> & 22<sup>nd</sup> and November 5<sup>th</sup>. He is alternating teaching Ladies Bible Study and the Sunday morning Bible Study with Pastor. He starts teaching the 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> graders midweek class, leading them through Old Testament this week.

There were no membership changes.

Old business was the news that 164 Personal Care Kits are packaged, labeled, and ready for delivery to the rail cars on Saturday, September 16<sup>th</sup>.

New business began with a discussion of the Quarterly Voters' Meeting date. Bill Steffenhagen moved to hold it between services October 22<sup>nd</sup>, Alex Rehlinger second, motion carried. Next up was the discussion of sending mission money to the Cayman Islands. Greg Frank moved to send \$1000 of our overage of mission funds for 2023 to Rev Gerald and Heidi Paul and add this amount to our missions pledge for 2024 and beyond. Paul Yamriska second, motion carried. Brad Larson brought up the subject of Michael Hendrickson's fund need at Seminary. The council noted that this is a subject for the Endowment Committee, so they will be contacted to set up a meeting, meanwhile a blurb in the bulletin reminding the congregation that we have seminary students would also be appropriate.

Paul Yamriska motioned to adjourn, Greg Frank second, motion carried at 7:30 pm.

The meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer.
