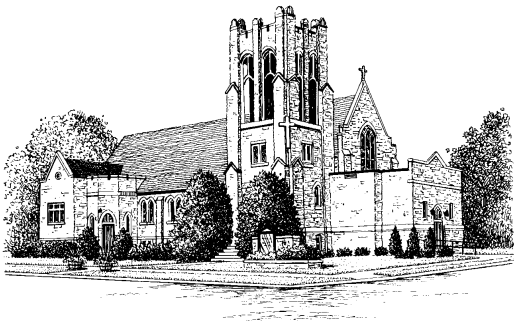

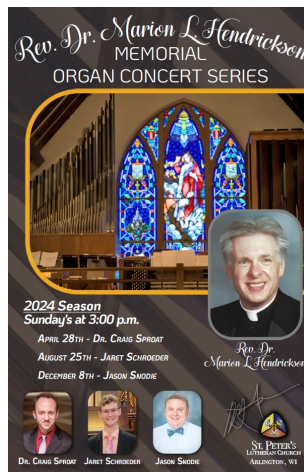
Beloved in the Lord:

The newest April event happens on April 28th as Dr. Craig Sproat of Concordia University in Mequon joins us for the first installment of the inaugural year of The Rev. Dr. Marion L. Hendrickson Memorial Organ Concert Series.

You've probably heard me mention in passing the organ concert series named after our beloved former pastor. The inspiration for this series came from Greg Zelek's organ concert last April here at St. Peter's. We have a very special instrument. Kantor Jeremy Zieroth is a tone poet, painting musical pictures to accompany

our singing the liturgy and hymns. Why not offer the same opportunity that Kantor has each week and Greg Zelek had last year for other talented organists? Thus began the idea for an organ concert series, mixing both sacred and secular pieces for the greater glory of God and for our enjoyment, too.



Pastor Hendrickson brought our congregation a tremendous gift of music during his 23 years of ministry in Arlington. I've heard stories of Madison Brass performing among us during Advent. I've seen pictures of Easter cantatas sung by our choir under Pastor Hendrickson's direction with guest musicians. I've heard Michael talk about his dad practicing his organ skills in the parsonage and in our church building. Music Ministry



It's Easter all month! That gives this cantor a chance to focus solely on an Easter hymn. Usually, there is a choice to be made between Easter and Holy Week hymnody, but not this year!

If you turn to LSB 484, you'll find a Slovak hymn, "Make Songs of Joy". This hymn was written by Juraj Tranovsky (1591-1637). He is sometimes called the "Father of Slovak hymnody" and sometimes the "Luther of the Slavs." The son of a blacksmith, he began studies at the University of Wittenberg in 1607. You'll recall that this was Luther's teaching post in the 1500s. Ordained in 1616, he spent his life teaching and preaching in Prague, Moravia, Silesia, and finally in Slovakia. Under Ferdinand II, Lutherans were persecuted, and Tranovsky was imprisoned in 1623. At that time two of his children also died of the plague.

Tranovsky was a lover of poetry and hymns. He issued several collections of hymns. His most famous work was *Cithara Sanctorum* (Lyre/Harp of the Saints), written in Czech in 1636. This volume has formed the basis of Czech and Slovak Lutheran hymnody to the present day. In addition to hymn collections, Tranovsky translated the Augsburg Confession in 1620 into Czech. These, together with Bible of Kralice, are the pillars that supported the Slovak Reformation. Our Lutheran Service Book has three of his hymns.

"Make Songs of Joy" was translated by Jaroslav Vajda (1919-2008), LCMS pastor and son of a Lutheran pastor of Slovak descent. He was a prolific hymn writer and translator, spending plenty of time translating Slovak writings into English.

The joy we have as Christians as we cele-

brate the resurrection of our Lord is expressed right away in the first line of the hymn, "Make songs of joy to Christ, our head." Paul discusses Christ as our head in Ephesians. He wrote: "[S]peaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love" (Ephesians 4:15-16). The image of Christ and his church is corporate. He is "our" head, not "my" head. Hence the Church corporate sings songs of joy and we grow in our Christian Faith within the Body of Christ, the Church, of whom Jesus is the head.

The reason for this joy is that our Lord has defeated the enemy. The enemy that receives special attention in this hymn is death. St. Paul tells the Corinthians:

⁵⁵ "O death, where is your victory
O death, where is your sting?"

⁵⁶ *The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law.* ⁵⁷ *But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. (1 Corinthians 15:55-57)*

In the 1 Corinthians passage Paul points also to the connection between death and sin. Christ's victory over death also means his victory over sin. As he is our head and we are his body, his victory is also our victory. When we sing "He lives again who once was dead", we could also say that we are singing "WE live again who once were dead", for we died and rose in Christ. Paul unpacks

this connection in Romans 6 when he writes about our baptism. Thanks to Christ's victory over death, and our connection to Christ through baptism, death and sin have lost their power over us. Christ was sinless (2 Corinthians 5:21) so our baptismal union with him also grants us his sinlessness.

As Paul points out in verse 57, our response is to thank God who gives us the victory through Jesus Christ. So our hymn is filled with praise and thanks. The repeated sings of "Alleluia" (which means "praise the Lord") keeps that before us, as do the English phrases like "For this be praised the Son who rose ... the Father and the Holy Ghost!"

Notice how Paul honestly indicates that we have done nothing to gain this victory—not works, prayers, contributions, and so on. He gives us the victory. In His grace and His unfath-

The vernal equinox has passed. Hopefully this means that the last of snow has come and gone until later this year. But whether it snows or not in April and early May this year, since the vernal equinox has passed, this means that it is technically spring.

With spring we look forward to the blooming and blossoming of flowers, the warmer weather, the increased daylight, and perhaps a view of some of the wildlife around us. Spring is a new beginning.

It is all the more fitting, then, that the Easter Season occurs in spring. The resurrection of Christ marks a new beginning, a new creation. This should be the time when we perhaps take renewed interest in our life as Christians. Perhaps it is with this season that we find that we should start regularly attending service again or have prayer and devotions in the home.

Yet how often do we start to try to do these things and yet fail again? How often do we think about going to service more often but then don't? How often do we think about having prayer and devotions in the home but fail to implement it? Our practice and fervor goes cold, like an early-spring freeze that wilts flowers and fruit and silences the chirping of spring birds.

What can we do about this? We can do nothing but pray. We pray that God would thaw our cold hearts and lead us to hear and obey His Word, no differently than how we pray to God that the early-spring freeze would go away quickly so not to ruin the blooming flowers and budding fruits. We pray that God would keep us humble, that we would acknowledge that we cannot save ourselves (or control the weather). We pray to God that we would answer our pleas for mercy, deliverance, and acceptance of any frugal and imperfect good work we attempt.

And God be praised. He does answer our pleas. He grants us mercy every day, through the daily repentance and contrition worked in us through our Baptism. He grants deliverance from sin, death, and Satan through the shedding of Jesus' blood and by His resurrection. He accepts our good works, even for as few and feeble as they are, because of the merits of Jesus imparted on us. All this God does because of His Love for us. Therefore, God will see us through this crazy and trying life, just as He sees us through the crazy and trying weather of a Wisconsin early spring.

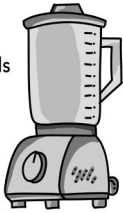

SOMETHING OLD, Something New

Use scrap paper to fuel new growth and make a gift that keeps on giving.

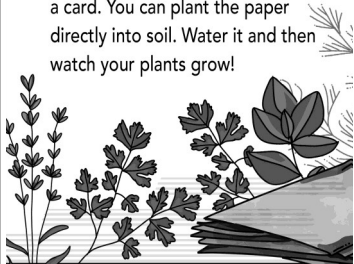
What you need:

- Scrap paper
- Water
- Herb or flower seeds
- Blender
- Strainer
- Cookie sheet
- Towel
- Adult help



What you do:

1. Tear the scrap paper into strips and place in a bowl. Cover the paper with water and let it soak overnight.
2. Pour the mixture into a blender and blend about 10 seconds.
3. Strain and squeeze the paper pulp to remove excess water. Place in a bowl.
4. Sprinkle seeds over the pulp and mix to incorporate them into the pulp.
5. Shape the pulp into a flat layer on the cookie sheet. Use a towel to soak up excess water. Allow the paper to dry completely.
6. Tear paper into shapes or fold into a card. You can plant the paper directly into soil. Water it and then watch your plants grow!



JESUS IS RISEN!

When Jesus' disciples saw that the stone was rolled away from his tomb, they knew he had risen. Make a moveable tomb to celebrate Easter.

What you need:

- 4 pieces of paper (brown, blue, black, yellow)
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Glue stick
- Brad fastener
- Marker



What you do:

1. Fold the brown paper in half, short side to short side. Cut along the fold. On one half, draw and cut out a large half-circle (the tomb). On the other, draw and cut out a palm-sized circle (the stone).
2. Glue the brown tomb onto the blue paper.
3. Cut a black circle (the inside of the tomb) the same size as the brown stone and glue it onto the brown tomb.
4. Place the brown stone over the black half-circle; this is the entrance. Push the brad through one edge so the stone can move from side to side.
5. Cut out a cross from the yellow paper and glue it by the tomb.
6. Write "Jesus is risen!" atop the blue paper.

omable way, in eternity, He chose those whom He would bring to faith in His Son through the Holy Spirit (Ephesians 1:4); He works through the Gospel, the Good News about Jesus (Romans 1:16), which can be rejected (Acts 13:46). Believers, however, cling to the Scriptures, Baptism, and the Lord's Supper (Acts 2:42).

Isaiah, through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, prophesied about what the Messiah would do to earn the victory.

⁴ Surely he has borne our griefs
and carried our sorrows;
yet we esteemed him stricken,
smitten by God, and afflicted.
⁵ But he was pierced for our transgressions;
he was crushed for our iniquities;
upon him was the chastisement that brought
us peace,
and with his wounds we are healed.
⁶ All we like sheep have gone astray;
we have turned—every one
—to his own way;
and the LORD has laid on him
the iniquity of us all. (Isaiah 53:4-6)

Jesus defeated three enemies: Satan, sin, and death. Satan, the perpetrator of sin, heaps problems upon us. God took all of them and put them on His Son. Those problems include our griefs, sorrows, transgressions, iniquities, and stripes

(scourging, wounds, and bruises). Isaiah wrote, "The LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all." That is when God accomplished his great purpose. That is what the cross of Christ is all about. Then He rose! Alleluia!

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COUNCIL MINUTES March 12, 2024

The March 12, 2024 meeting of the St. Peter's Lutheran Church council meeting was called to order by President Cameron Gramse at 6:33pm. This meeting was held in the conference room. Vicar Sinatra presented the opening devotion from Hebrews 9. Jesus' sacrifice only had to be made one time. Prior to Jesus, the high priests needed to make repeated sacrifices. Jesus' superior sacrifice paid the price for our sins once and for all time.

Agenda was presented. Dan Schmidt moved approval, Brad Larson second, motion carried.

Secretary's minutes were read. Paul Yamriska moved approval, Dan Schmidt second, motion carried.

Financial Secretary's report was given by acting Financial Secretary Bob Hagenow. Two months do not make a trend but we are trailing 2023 giving. Only at 73% of prior year for general fund contributions and at 92% of projected expenses. Mission giving is at 116% of amount pledged for 2024. Online giving for February saw 8.5% for general fund giving and 5.3% for mission giving. Joey Pascavis has expressed interest in taking over as the Financial Secretary. He and Bob will work together for a couple of weeks and then our Council President can appoint him if he so wished to fill the role and that action can then be reatified at the Voters' meeting. Brad Larson moved approval of the report, Alex Rehlinger second, motion carried.

Treasurer's report was given by Lynnette Taylor. The checkbook balance as of today is \$12,633.86. No out of the ordinary expenses from the general fund. Two large payments made from the Special Purpose account were the payment to Heins Contracting for completion of the roof of the parsonage and the roof and siding of the vicarage, and final payment to Kessenichs for installation of the dishwasher. Dan Schmidt moved to approve the Treasurer report, Payl Yamriska second, motion carried.

The Board of Elder's report was given by Alex Rehlinger. The Easter Egg Hunt is approaching and Brad has the egg stuffings ordered, he will be ordering donuts from Woodmans soon. Luncheon at Calvary Lutheran Chapel will happen on Sunday, April 28th and Vicar Sinatra will be going along as well for that event. Christian Women's Council met and made decisions for their annual tithing. The two seminary students from St. Peter's and the two local food pantries were recipients this year as well as our Vicar fund. They are going to hold their annual Spring Plant & Bake Sale on May 10-11, 2024. They are also planning a wedding shower for Josie Zweifel, Vicar Sinatra's fiancé, for April 27th. Spring cleaning of the sanctuary and narthex is scheduled for the week of March 18-22 but realizing the late notice some items may get cleaned during Holy Week. There was no update from the Military Care committee. The Endowment Committee did meet with Michael Hendrickson while he was here on break and they opted to send him the \$600 he was short of meeting the Spring Quarter seminary bill. The Oakwood Community has installed a new CEO this winter. Cantor's report: Cantor Zieroth is attending the Portage High School Concert this evening, where Katze is in both band and choir. Music continues to go well. Every group is actively practicing for upcoming days, including Holy Week. Mr. Trevor Magness is slated to play the first weekend of both April and May. He will be attending his godson's wedding in Phoenix the first weekend of April. Cantor's whole family will be attending a goddaughter's confirmation in south central Indiana in May. The next organ concert is April 28 at 3pm with recitalist Dr. Craig Sproat from Concordia University, WI.

Board of Trustee's Report was presented by Greg Frank and Steve Paskey. The church roof will get redone when the temperature outside is more consistently 50°. The Stain Glass

Windows will also get started when weather is warmer. The lawn fertilizing bid came in for 2024, will remain the same as previous year. The Trustees will go ahead with this company again this year. They are making plans to do outside clean up this spring following the roof repairs.

Board of Christian Education report was given by Charlotte Reddeman. The Child Care Center enrollment remains the same. The teachers have a training course in Madison. They have hired a new teacher, Riley Nugent will be starting later this month. The director has mentioned a few brainstorming ideas for the playground such as a more permanent roof for the winter months and potentially using more green space such as the vicarage back yard. They also need to upgrade some of the equipment used on the playground (ie: wooden tables & playhouse to replace the broken/cracked plastic ones). Sunday School has an all grades activity this coming weekend. The Ladies Bible Study is finishing the 7 Deadly Sins; the men are studying the book of Acts; and Sunday morning between services are continuing on the path of the Minor Prophets. The Midweek students will have their last day on March 20th. The confirmands will continue for a couple of weeks, getting in their conversations with the Elders and finishing up confirmation items. New candle lighters have arrived and are ready for use.

Pastor's Report was given by Rev. David Juhl. Attendance for February was up bringing the average for 2024 to 110 per weekend. In Madison North and South circuit matters Living Christ, Madison remains vacant. Looking ahead one catechumen (Jesse Zieroth) will receive First Communion Maundy Thursday, March 28th. The other eligible catechumens (Taylon Albrecht, Timothy Juhl, and Kandyn Mack) have chosen to wait. Confirmation is scheduled for Sunday, April 14, 2024 at the 10:30 Divine Service. Christopher Juhl, Payten See, and Spencer Serwe are this year's pending confirmands. Payten's and Christopher's examination is Wednesday, April 10th at 6:30 PM. Due to a schedule conflict, Spencer's examination date will be determined by the elders tonight. There will be NO MONDAY NIGHT DIVINE SERVICE on April 1st and April 15th. He and Vicar will be at the District Pastors Conference in Manitowoc from April 15-17. We'll know whether we receive a vicar, and who he is, either April 23rd (St. Louis) or April 24th (Ft. Wayne). Sunday, April 28th is the first in the Marion Hendrickson Memorial Organ Concert Series. Dr. Craig Sproat of Concordia University Wisconsin will perform that afternoon.

Vicar Report was given by Vicar Nicholas Sinatra. Much of his time is occupied by the same things as before, writing sermons, teaching and leading Bible studies, helping Pastor with home bound visits and taking care of some of our IT items here at St. Peter's.

St. Peter's has received a request from Amber Schwartz and her sons; Hayden, Wyatt, and Myles to transfer here from St. John's, Portage. Charlotte Reddeman made the motion to approve the transfer, Brad Larson second, motion carried.

There was no old business.

New business: The April quarterly meeting date needs to be set. Steve Paskey moved that we hold that meeting on Sunday, April 21, 2024 between services at 9:30 am. Paul Yamriska provided the second, motion carried.

Dan Schmidt moved to adjourn, Steve Paskey second, motion carried at 7:22 pm.

The meeting was closed with Lord's Prayer.
