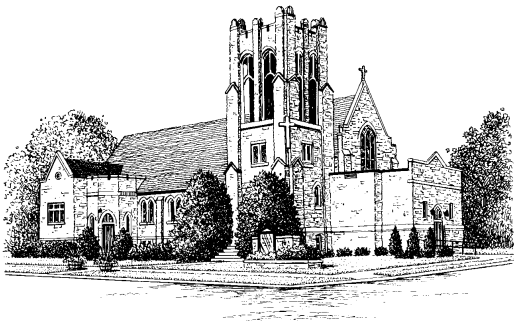

Beloved in the Lord:

The return of warmer weather is a harbinger of change not only in nature, but also in our lives together. As much as we have grown to love Vicar Nick Sinatra over the past ten months, we cannot hang on to him much longer. Nick's last weekend among us will be July 7th and 8th. Nick and his soon-to-be bride Josie will move back to Fort Wayne, IN for his final year of seminary studies. Next April, God willing, Nick will receive his first divine call into the Holy Ministry and be placed in a congregation somewhere in our synod. Nick and I look forward to a strong finish to his service among us.

We will welcome our tenth vicar in mid-July! Kyle Bliss is a pastor's son. He most recently lived in northern Minnesota. He is a graduate of Concordia University in St. Paul, MN. He is a single man. We will get to know more about Kyle soon. He may even visit us later this month on his way home from Ft. Wayne.

Music Ministry



As I look through my records, I realize I have never done a newsletter article on an Ascension hymn since I've been here. For obvious reasons, I am now rectifying that and catching up with our hymn of the day for Ascension, "Up through Endless Ranks of Angels" (LSB 491).

Nostalgia. A yearning for past times. Can you think of a situation in your past? This would be a time when you were much younger. You ended up in the same room as, or maybe even met a pretty famous person. But, you were much younger than you are now. Due to your lack of maturity, you didn't fully understand the significance of being in the same room as this person. It was nice to be near them at the time. But now that you are grown and can look back on the significance this person had in history, you have so many questions! There are so many things that would have been great to know about that person. There are so many insights you could have gained or little tidbits of wisdom they could have shared with you! Instead, at the time, it was just another day in your life with some other person. Oh, to be able to go back and enjoy the time more fully!

I suspect something of that kind of nostalgia nagged the back of the mind of the disciples as they stood on the soil of Bethany, the space in the center of their circle still vacant and empty. Jesus has just ascended into heaven, leaving them there. If only they knew then what they know now, the questions they would ask.

This is a typical feeling on Ascension Day, a kind of nostalgia that persists even to us today. But that is not the journey that the author of this hymn, Jary Vajda, wants to take us on while we are singing. Notice the perspective he sets up in the first verse. We are not the disciples looking up. We see through the eyes of our ascended Lord:

*"Up through endless ranks of angels
Cries of triumph in His ears,
To His heavenly throne ascending
Having vanquished all their fears*

*Christ looks down upon His faithful
Leaving them in happy tears."*

The effect is to bring us into an eternal present moment. The "Cries of triumph" aren't merely the shouts of angels as the resurrected Christ rises through their midst. Our voices—even as we sing this very song—mix with their echoes. We stand in the same choir.

*Death-destroying, life-restoring,
Proven Equal to our need,
Now for us before the Father
As our brother intercede;
Flesh that for our world was wounded,
Living, for the wounded plead!*

The hymn then proceeds to narrate exactly what it is that makes such an eternal victory worth celebrating. "Death-destroying, life-restoring, / Proven Equal to our need" (an example of outstanding vintage Vajda wordsmithing). What a way to state the work of God in Christ at the center of history. This Cantor, before this article, never fully wrestled with the picture of Jesus being our "Proven Equal." But that is just what is required for the repayment of our sins – the equal antidote. So we continue with this exuberant exchange: "Flesh that for our world was wounded, / Living, for the wounded plead!"

Likewise, we anticipate the Spirit of Pentecost—"Send Your Spirit, promised guide". We now approach the threshold between festive season of the year and ordinary time.

*To our lives of wanton wandering
Send your promised Spirit-Guide;
Through our lives of fear and failure
With your pow'r and love abide:
Welcome us, as you were welcomed,
To an endless Eastertide.*

Thus we end in doxology, standing to invoke the Three in One, giving praise by repeating the only word that can name our awe: "Alleluia, alleluia!" It is only then that we see how far Mr. Vajda has brought us. We too have ascended "through endless ranks of angels...to breathe the Spirit's grace...to see the Father's face...to feel the Son's embrace." And it is a full-bodied flight into joy, where we are welcomed "as You were welcomed." This is the joy of the Ascension, not that he has left us behind, but that he brings us to where he is. This is an eternally present moment, and he uses words that resonate the Word made flesh, in a table set with the bread of life.

May you enjoy this hymn anew as we celebrate on Ascension Day, Thursday, May 9, 40 days after Easter, at 6:30pm.

“Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh.” (Genesis 2:24 ESV)

Man and woman together as one. Two parts become one unit. This is how God created and designed marriage. The man and the woman are no longer just themselves but also their other half. One flesh. The man's triumphs and sorrows become part of his

wife. Conversely, the woman's triumphs and sorrows become part of her husband. Financial assets and liabilities become shared. Reputations are intertwined. Children have a mix of both their father and mother's likenesses, both in physical traits and personality.

It should surprise few readers of this publication that this author has marriage high on his mind. After all, he is to be married in about month's time at the time of writing. However, marriage is more than just the reality of married people.

For the Christian, marriage is the reality of the Christian life. Christ is the bridegroom and the Church the bride. And the Christian is part of the Church, part of the bride. And since Christ and His bride, the church, are one flesh, therefore the Christian is also part of the body of Christ. And therefore in this marriage, there also is an exchange.

Christ, the husband, is perfect in every way. He is the Lord of All, eternal and immortal. He is sinless, having never committed a sin. He has overcome every temptation Satan has thrown at Him. And since Christ is sinless, He is innocent and pure. Christ is righteous.

But the Bride, the church, that is to say human beings such as you and I, is a different story. We are the opposite of perfect. We are corrupted and imperfect. And as a result of our sin, we are mortal, and we all shall die some day. And we regularly fall into Satan's temptations, our human flesh all too often too weak to resist. We are impure and guilty, deserving of death and damnation.

But that does not stop the Blessed Exchange. Christ, our husband, takes our imperfection, our mortality, our sin, and our guilt upon Himself to the cross to die. Thus, Christ became sin. St. Paul tells us, “For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God” (2 Corinthians 5:21 ESV).

But while He takes all our worthless qualities, we gain all of His qualities. We are made perfect before God's eyes. We are given His immortality and His sinlessness. He is clothed with His righteousness. In this way, the bridegroom redeems the bride.

Although our earthly marriages are not the spitting perfect image of this reality at times, nevertheless this marriage of Christ and the Church is the reality we have as Christians. So rejoice, O Bride of Christ, for He has redeemed you and made you His own, and in Him you have that certain Hope of Salvation.

Crockpot Red Beans and Rice

Ingredients

- 1 lb of red beans
- 1 onion diced
- 1 bell pepper diced
- 1 package smoked sausage (cut however you want)
- 1 stick of butter
- a little less than 6 cups of water (because it gets some liquid from ingredients)
- Seasoning - add to your taste:
 - Tony Chachere's Cajun Seasoning
 - garlic powder
- White Rice

Directions

1. Add all ingredients except the white rice to the crockpot. Sprinkle top with garlic powder & Tony's.
2. Cook on high for 6-8 hrs. Every crockpot is different, so cooking time might vary. Beans will be tender when done.
3. Turn off heat, stir and let cool a little so it will thicken a little.
4. Serve over hot, white rice cooked separately.

Tips

You can add extra ingredients depending on what you prefer: I typically add freshly diced garlic and a package of cubed ham pieces.

a fun Flower Frog

A flower frog sits atop a vase to help arrange flowers and hold stems in place. This personalized frog will become a favorite!

What you need:

- Air-dry clay
- Roller
- Vase (or jar)
- Plastic knife
- Straw
- Acrylic paint and brushes



What you do:

1. Roll out a portion of clay to about ½-inch thickness.
2. Cut out a circle that's slightly larger than the vase opening. (This will allow the finished frog to sit securely on top.)
3. To make holes for stems, use a straw to punch out circle shapes. If you make more than one frog, try arranging the holes in different patterns.
4. Let dry completely. Then personalize your work with acrylic paint.
5. When dry, place the frog atop the vase. Arrange flowers and greenery to make a Mother's Day bouquet.



Make this craft to display a bit of springtime year-round!

What you need:

- An old shirt
- Tempura paint (brown, dark pink, light pink and white)
- Paintbrush
- Light blue or white construction paper
- A paper plate
- Q-tips
- Paper towels



What you do:

1. Roll up one sleeve and paint your arm and the palm of your hand brown.
2. Lengthwise on the paper, carefully place your painted arm and hand, with fingers spread apart. (This is the tree trunk and branches.)
3. Place the other paint colors on the plate.
4. Using Q-tips, place dots of paint (blossoms!) all over the branches.
5. When dry, display your tree — or give it as a Mother's Day gift.

COUNCIL MINUTES April 9, 2024

The April 9, 2024 meeting was called to order by President Cameron Gramse at 6:33pm. This meeting was held in the conference room. Pastor Juhl presented the opening devotion from Ezekiel 37:3. What word brings bones to life? The Spirit working through the breath, the breath of life. What brings all things to life? The breath of God, the breath of the Preacher as he speaks the Word of God.

The Agenda was presented. Calvin Moll moved approval, Dan Schmidt second, motion carried.

Secretary's minutes were read. Jeremy pointed out that he was not present at last month's meeting. Brad Larson moved to approve the report with that correction noted, Mike Pertzborn second, motion carried.

Financial Secretary's report was given by acting Financial Secretary Bob Hagenow with Joey Pascavis along to learn. A very solid March with all of the Lent & Easter services. General fund giving is at 124% of February realizing that there are 5 Sundays in March vs only 4 in February. Also 148% of last March again though with only 4 Sundays in 2023. Mission giving is at 202% of February and at 156% of March 2023. We are at exactly 90% of the giving vs the end of March 2023 and 89.8% of our projected expenses. Remembering that if we are able to stay at or above 90% of our projected expenses we should come out alright by the end of the year. That is something that we are going to have to keep an eye on in the coming months. A solid 9.8% of general fund giving came from the online giving platform. The special purpose funds that were heavily funded during March were Memorials, the Stain Glass Windows and the Vicar fund for both this year and next. Dan Schmidt moved approval of the report, Meg Hanson second, carried.

Treasurer's report given by Meg Hanson. The checkbook balance today is \$1,140.63. One more expense for snow removal yet this year. No other out of ordinary expenses. Mike Pertzborn moved to approve Treasurer report, Calvin Moll second, carried.

Board of Elder's report was given by Alex Rehlinger. A huge thank you to Pastor and Vicar for their hard work and time in getting the Easter and Holy Week services to come together so well. The Easter Egg Hunt had a lower attendance (37 kids) than last year but that could be attributed to being held the same week as Spring Break. Luncheon at Calvary Lutheran Chapel will happen on Sunday, April 28th and sign up sheets have been posted on the narthex bulletin board. That same day is the first in the *Rev. Dr. Marion L. Hendrickson Memorial Organ Concert Series* with Dr. Craig Sproat providing the music. Christian Women's Council to hold their annual Spring Plant & Bake Sale on May 10-11, 2024. Sign up sheets for that are up as well. The wedding shower for Josie Zweifel, Vicar Sinatra's fiancée, for April 27th has a sign up sheet as well as an RSVP for Vicar & Josie's wedding on May 25th. There was no update from the Military Care committee. No Endowment scholarship applications turned in. Cantor's report: Cantor Zieroth reported that we made it through the Easter services with all choirs and instrumentalists doing an exceptional job. Mr. Trevor Magness played this past weekend and will play again in May when Cantor's whole family will be attending a goddaughter's confirmation in south central Indiana. The adult choir will be performing with the upper grade Sunday School during their next performance.

Board of Trustee's Report was presented by Calvin Moll. The church roof is currently being worked on and they are anticipating being finished in 10-12 days. The boilers are still having trouble with producing heat at all times. Many people have looked into the problem but so far no solution has been found. They will continue to try and diagnose the problem. The Stain Glass Windows should get started some time in April. The lawn mowing bid from Brown's is in the works and they will bring it forward when we receive it.

Board of Christian Education report was given by Charlotte

Reddeman. The Child Care Center enrollment is at 30 students and will be completely full during the summer months. Riley Nugent has started this month. The center will be doing a celebration sometime this summer a sort of Class Reunion as they turn 30 years old. Sunday School last day for this school year will be May 19th. The midweek classes had their last day on March 20th. Jesse Zieroth received First Communion on March 28th. The Ladies Bible Study is starting a new topic; the men are studying the book of Acts; and Sunday morning between services are continuing on the path of the Minor Prophets. Three students will be confirmed on April 14th: Christopher Marvin Juhl, Payten Ann Casey See, and Spencer Scott Serwe.

Pastor's Report was given by Rev. David Juhl. Attendance during the first quarter of 2024 sits at 118 per weekend. Official Acts performed in March were the funeral of Philip Hanson (March 12th), First Communion for Jesse Zieroth (March 28th); and the Baptism of Laura Alice Puntney (March 30th). Madison North and South Circuit Matters: Living Christ, Madison remains vacant. Pastor Greg Hovland is deliberating a call from St. John's, Portage to Trinity, Mequon (Freistadt), WI. Looking ahead to Confirmation on Sunday, April 14, 2024 at the 10:30 Divine Service. Christopher Juhl, Payten See, and Spencer Serwe are this year's confirmands. All three were involved in a conversation before three elders on Wednesday, April 3rd to confess their faith. There will be no Monday night divine service on April 15th as Pastor and Vicar will be at District Pastors Conference in Manitowoc from April 15-17. We are pre-slotted to receive a vicar from Ft. Wayne on Tuesday, April 23rd. Vicar Sinatra's last weekend with us is July 7/8. Vicar and Josie's wedding Saturday, May 25th at 10:00 AM at St. Peter's. Vicar Sinatra will be unavailable from May 25th to June 1st while he is on his honeymoon. Sunday, April 28th is the first in the Marion Hendrickson Memorial Organ Concert Series. Dr. Craig Sproat of Concordia University Wisconsin will perform for us that afternoon. Pastor will be taking vacation time from Tuesday, April 30th through Saturday, May 4th to visit family in southern Illinois. Vicar Sinatra will be here to cover his absence. Pastor will also be taking vacation time from Friday, June 14th through Sunday, June 16th for his annual in-law camping weekend at Camp Sinawa near Valders. Pastor Allen Strawn from Calvary, Madison will preside over Divine Service on Sunday June 16th while Vicar Sinatra preaches. Pastor will be here to preside over Divine Service on Monday, June 17th. He'll also be on vacation from Tuesday, June 25th through Saturday, June 29th with his family in Tomahawk. Vicar Sinatra will be here to cover his absence.

Vicar Report was given by Vicar Nicholas Sinatra. Much of his time is occupied by the same things as before, writing sermons, teaching and leading Bible study on Sunday mornings, helping Pastor with home bound visits and taking care of some of our IT items here. Oh, and there is a wedding on the horizon.

Paul Yamriska moved to accept as communicant members the three students to be confirmed this next weekend: Christopher Juhl, Payten See, and Spencer Serwe. Charlotte Reddeman provided the second, motion carried.

There was no old business.

New business: President Cameron Gramse mentioned that he would like to appoint members to fill the two open positions on the church council. Meg Hanson moved to accept Lynnette Taylor as Council Secretary for another two year term, Dan Schmidt second, motion carried. Paul Yamriska moved to take to the Voters' the appointment of Joseph (Joey) Pascavis as Financial Secretary, Alex Rehlinger seconded, motion carried.

Calvin Moll moved to adjourn, Brad Larson second, motion carried at 7:16 pm. The meeting closed with Common Doxology.




