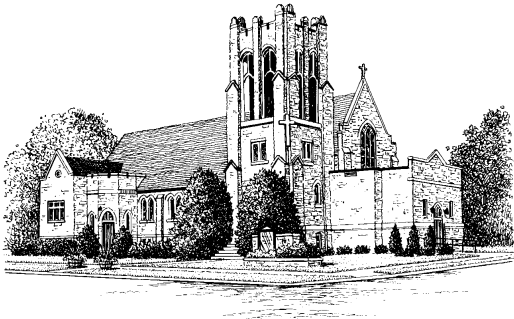




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ST. PETER'S NET NOVEMBER 2024

Beloved in the Lord:

Six names from St. Peter's congregation have been added to the Church Triumphant since last All Saints Day. While we miss them this side of Paradise, we rejoice that they rest in the nearer presence of Christ, awaiting Judgment Day and the dawn of the New Creation.

It is my pleasure to meet with grieving families before the funeral of their loved one to help them select Scripture readings and hymns for a Christian burial. Sometimes the task is easy because instructions were left for the pastor by the one who has died. I know of at least one family in our congregation who have plans for their funerals in my study desk. Sometimes the task is difficult because there are so many meaningful Bible passages and so many meaningful hymns that, without your guidance, your loved ones will have a tough time to limit the funeral to three Bible readings, three hymns, and one psalm.

With end of the year holidays in sight, now is a good time to figure out what you would like your funeral service to say to those gathered on that day. Let me give you some things to think about as you make plans.



- A Christian burial proclaims the resurrected Christ. Perhaps you've been to a secular funeral where speakers reminisce about good times and great memories. There's room for reminiscing in a Christian funeral sermon, but your pastor doesn't want to overdo it. The most important story told in a funeral sermon is the resurrection of Jesus Christ. You are baptized into Jesus's death and resurrection. All that our Savior does is done for you.
- As it goes for the sermon, so it goes for hymns. You want your funeral hymns to preach the Good News that because Jesus lives, you also shall live. My suggestion on funeral hymns is that you can't go wrong with any hymn in the Easter section of Lutheran Service Book. Another suggestion is to think outside the box and pick hymns not often heard at a Christian burial. There's nothing wrong with the standard hymns (Amazing Grace, How Great Thou Art, On Eagle's Wings, etc.) yet there's also room for something different that is fitting for a funeral. Kantor Zieroth and I would be happy to help if you need suggestions.

- What Scripture readings should you consider? 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18, where St. Paul vividly describes Judgment Day in terms of the resurrection of the body, is a grand slam Bible text for a Christian funeral. So is a portion of 1 Corinthians chapter 15, the Resurrection Chapter. Any Bible passages that speak of the comfort of Christ's resurrection are appropriate. The same can be said for Old Testament passages that speak of the certain hope of the life of the world to come. Psalm 23 and Psalm 46 are great psalms among others. I have a list of preferred Scripture passages that I am able to share with you when you are ready to plan your funeral.

Whenever you decide to plan your funeral, begin with prayer and take your time. Don't be bashful to ask for help from your family, from Kantor Zieroth, and from me. We are here to help you comfort your family and friends with the joyful proclamation of "Jesus is my confidence!"

HYMN STUDY:

To Thee, Omniscient Lord of All – LSB 613

We have a treat this year. Due to this year's early Easter and a switch back to the one year lectionary, we'll celebrate the 25th Sunday after Trinity! From this Kantor's research, the last best chance St. Peter's had of having this Sunday could've been either 1986 or 1978. Either way, not recently!

The 25th Sunday after Trinity this year is November 17/18, and our opening hymn for that weekend is by the Norwegian poet and hymnist Magnus Brostrup Landstad. He was born in 1802 in Masoy, Finnmarken, which is on an island very near the northernmost point of Norway. The harsh climate of northern Norway and the poverty of his family meant that his childhood was very difficult. He was taught at home by his father and, at the age of twenty, entered the University of Christiania in Oslo. He went on to be Pastor of several different churches throughout the country. It was while he was at the university that he came across hymns by German hymn writer Philip Nicolai, famous for "*Wake, Awake, for Night is Flying*".

Inspired by Nicolai, Landstad began writing his own hymns. His own writing expertise, along with his interest in the folk songs of Norway, led him to publish his own hymnal in 1861. This hymnal became the official hymnal of the country of Norway in 1869. On his retirement, he was granted a pension by the government for his service to the church and his work as a poet and publisher. The tune, VATER UNSER, was set by Martin Luther for his catechetical hymn on the Lord's Prayer. That hymn, *Our Father, Who From Heaven Above*, can be found at LSB 766

This hymn, *To Thee, Omniscient Lord of All*, is a short three stanza hymn. Each stanza is based on a penitential verse from the Bible. Much like a good sermon, this hymn takes those penitential Bible verses and applies them to the singer. The confessions of Ezra, David, and the tax collector of Luke 18 become our own.

1: *To Thee, omniscient Lord of all,
In grief and shame I humbly call;*

*I see my sins against Thee, Lord,
The sins of thought and deed and word.
They press me sore; I cry to Thee:
O God, be merciful to me!*

This stanza is based on Ezra 9:6.

"O my God, I am ashamed and blush to lift my face to you, my God, for our iniquities have risen higher than our heads, and our guilt has mounted up to the heavens.

In context, Ezra is praying about the sin of intermarriage. The remnant has returned from exile and now they are disobeying God's law and marrying people from all the surrounding nations. Ezra knows that his people deserved God's wrath and punishment, and this is why he is so ashamed. If we are truly sorry for our sins, this will be our response as well. We cry at the end of this and every stanza that God would be merciful to us.

2: *O Lord, my God, to Thee I pray:
O cast me not in wrath away!
Let Thy good Spirit ne'er depart,
But let Him draw to Thee my heart
That truly penitent I be:
O God, be merciful to me!*

This stanza is based on Psalm 51:10-11

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. ¹¹ Cast me not away from your presence, and take not your Holy Spirit from me.

Psalm 51 is the great penitential Psalm of David, written and earnestly prayed while awaiting the full punishment for committing adultery with Bathsheba and having her husband Uriah murdered. David knew that he deserved to be cast off, or thrown away, because of the sins he had committed. He also understood that his sin showed a need for a clean heart. A clean heart only happens through the work of the Holy Spirit. Do we really deserve to join in the penitential prayer of an adulterer and murderer? Sadly, yes, because we too sin against God and show that our hearts are unclean. We pray in this second stanza that God would not take His Holy Spirit from us, but continue to work in our hearts.

3: *O Jesus, let Thy precious blood/
Be to my soul a cleansing flood.
Turn not, O Lord, Thy guest away,
But grant that justified I may
Go to my house at peace with Thee:
O God, be merciful to me!*

This last stanza is based on Luke 18:12-14:

¹³*But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even lift up his eyes to heaven, but beat his breast, saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' ¹⁴I tell you, this man went down to his house justified, rather than the other. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted."*

Here is our third great Scriptural example of penitential prayer. It comes from one of Jesus' parables, where he contrasts this prayer of confession with the self-righteous prayer of a Pharisee. Again the example and parallel to our lives is striking. May we all take these words to heart! The hymn ends with a plea to God's mercy, but in a very specific way. The hymn allows us to appeal to the precious blood of Jesus, which was shed to cleanse us from our sins. We know that we are forgiven for Jesus' sake and that we will leave the worship service justified before God and at peace. Thanks be to God!

*But if we confess our sins, God, who is faithful and just,
will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.
1 John 1:8-9*

Why have confession at the end of the church year? Our readings focus greatly on the end times preceding the imminent return of Christ. While his blood covers our sins, we still know we daily sin much. So, we keep Christ ever before us, receiving his forgiveness constantly, sharing his forgiveness with our neighbors constantly, all in preparation for the imminent last day where sin is wiped out. Come quickly, Lord Jesus!

All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this I owe it to Him to thank and praise, serve and obey Him. This is most certainly true.

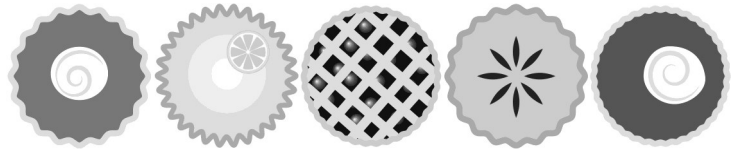
Thanksgiving is the Christian's natural response to what God has freely given, both in life here and now and in eternity. The Christian life lived in thanksgiving is a life freely lived before a good and gracious God and Father.



Because thanksgiving is only given when man stands before a gracious God, the life of thanksgiving can really only be talked about in the life of a Christian. Other people may have an understanding of gratitude, "I'm alive, the sun is shining, I have my friends, I have my family, it's a good day," but nothing is guaranteed. The certainty of a Christian before a gracious God is ultimately the certainty of faith, "By faith we understand that the universe was created by the word of God, so that what is seen was not made out of things that are visible," (Heb. 11:3). Faith grasps God's Word, specifically God's Word in Christ, and it is by this that God is revealed as our gracious Heavenly Father. It is then only in Christ through faith that man stands before God as His gracious maker and merciful Father.

What this then means for us during this time of Thanksgiving is that we above all give thanks for God's Word to us in Christ. It is this Word that upholds all the world. It is by this Word that the sun shines, the harvest grows, and life in this world continues. It is by this Word that we will be raised up on the last day to eternal life in the new creation. We live before God now in faith and thanksgiving because of what He has done through His Incarnate Word, Jesus Christ, who has blotted out our sins and made us righteous in His sight. Above all this thanksgiving, we give thanks that in Christ we stand before a gracious and loving God who has made us His own and cares for all our needs.

Make decorative stones as reminders of God's many great attributes.

What you need:

- Flat, smooth stones
- Printed, decorative napkins
- Paintbrush
- Clear-drying craft glue
- Scissors
- Permanent marker

What you do:

1. Unfold the napkin, carefully separating the printed side from the solid side.
2. Brush a thin layer of glue atop a stone. Lay the napkin (printed side up) on the glue and press down. Paint more glue over the napkin. Let dry.
3. Turn the stone over and paint more glue on the back. Wrap the napkin edges around the stone, trimming as needed. Paint more glue over the napkin. Let dry.
4. On the stone, write an attribute of God (loving, wise, powerful, merciful, etc.).
5. Repeat with more stones. Use them as gifts, paperweights, table decorations, etc.



Holiday PLACE MATS

What you need:

- Large pieces of paper
- Several large leaves
- Crayons (fall colors)
- Fine-tip permanent marker

What you do:

1. Working on a flat surface, place the leaves underneath the paper.

The meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer.

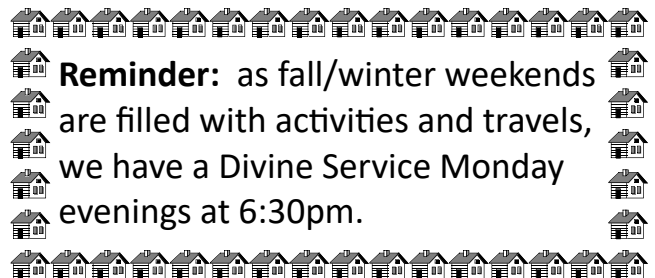

COUNCIL MINUTES October 8, 2024

The October 8, 2024 meeting of the St. Peter's Lutheran Church council meeting was called to order by President Cameron Gramse at 6:38pm. This meeting was held in the conference room. Pastor Juhl presented the opening devotion from Ephesians chapter 5 which reminds us to walk in love but make the best use of our time that we have between now and when Jesus returns. We should be filled with the Holy Spirit, submitting in reverence to Christ by serving one another. That is the best way to proclaim Jesus Christ to our community.

The Agenda was presented. President Cameron Gramse asked that "use of downstairs space" be added to Old Business. Calvin Moll moved approval with the addition, Dan Schmidt second, motion carried.

Secretary's minutes were read. Mike Pertzborn moved to approve the minutes, Dan Schmidt second, carried.

Financial Secretary's report was given by Lynnette Taylor. September was short of the goal of \$18,500 that we need to make projected expenses. We are still way ahead of giving for Mission Funds for the year. Special Purpose had a very good month with a large contribution to the Vicar fund and a couple of windows being sponsored as well as a large contribution to the Altar Guild for a new set of green paraments, which we may get to see yet this season. Calvin Moll moved approval of the report, Stephen Saager second, motion carried.

The Treasurer's report was given by Lynnette Taylor. The checkbook balance as of today is \$8,676.87, note that this is after having a very large deposit this first week of October. There will be another deposit before payroll is withdrawn so as of now we are okay funds wise in the general fund. The insurance premium for Fremont Insurance breakdown is as follows: Property Coverage is \$14,209 per year, Worker's Compensation policy is \$2,165 per year, and the Umbrella Policy for excess coverage is \$605 per year. This comes out to a 31.9% increase over last year. Our monthly premium will be \$1,451 from now through July. The annual elevator maintenance contract is due and has an 8% increase. That \$1,101 will be transferred from the building fund. Alex Rehlinger moved to approve the Treasurer report, Dan Schmidt second, motion carried.

Board of Elder's report was given by Alex Rehlinger. Services are continuing to go well and the elders are happy that the acolyte schedule is up and running and such a good response. Charlotte did remind the elders that if she is not here on a particular Sunday that they should remember to let the acolytes know when it is time to go and light the candles as sometimes they are unsure of the timing. Advent cards are getting ordered so that outreach will go out soon. The Christian Women's Council will put out a notice this week in the bulletin to get a feel for how many pie makers they can count on for this holiday season's pie sales. How many makers will determine if they will be able to allow ordering carte blanche or if they will only be able to make a certain number of pies. Calvary Lutheran Chapel has us on their schedule for luncheon on November 17th. The organizers are again going to be asking for volunteers for baking desserts and for serving the luncheon. There were no updates from Military Care Committee, Oakwood Community, or the Endowment Committee. Cantor's report: Lots of good stuff happening: Handbells, choir and Sunday School choirs have all started with Handbells, choir, and the lower Sunday School grades having had performances already. Becky Juhl and Jaret Schroeder covered the music while Cantor was at a nephew's wedding late last month. There is another

organ concert coming up on December 8th. Reformation is the last Sunday in October with instrumentalists performing. Thanksgiving is coming with extra stuff happening for the [Tuesday] evening service that week. And Advent starts soon with all of its extra stuff before we get into the busy season of Christmas.



The Board of Trustee's Report was presented by Calvin Moll. The roof on the bell tower and the one on the south side will be fixed in the month of October. There is still no word on the supplies for the windows. The parsonage has a failing ceiling fan in the master bedroom, that will be replaced soon. It was mentioned that the chandelier above the stairways in the narthex needs some replacement bulbs.

The Board of Christian Education report was given by Charlotte Reddeman. Sunday School is up and running and the teachers are doing great. Bike-a-thon was held Sunday, October 6th and had really good attendance. There were 683 laps made totalling 273 miles by 20 students (including 3 not quite old enough for Sunday School yet), 1 neighbor, 12 adults, and 2 dogs. Thirteen of the riders made the 25 lap mark and will receive a \$10 Subway gift card. Four of those made the 50 lap mark and they will be receiving a \$25 Culver's gift card. We will update the pledges when those have been turned in. Midweek classes have begun, Vicar has 5 students in 6th and 7th grades, Pastor has 10 students in 5th and 8th grades. The High School Youth group event at the end of September didn't have any attendees, perhaps because the timing was not ideal with that being Poynette homecoming weekend. Pastor and Vicar will try again and hope for a better response. Bible Studies are all back in session. Sundays Vicar is moving through Matthew. The Ladies group is about the same. The men on Saturday have lost a few members so are looking for more participants. The CCC has 32 enrolled with more starting in October and November. The wait list continues to grow for 2025 and 2026. Cathy did have a conversation with Al Buchner regarding the Methodist church building. He is still open to negotiations about renting or selling it. The biggest struggle we see with it is staffing as we are having trouble getting more staff here for our center much less having to hire more if we were to expand into an infant center.

The Pastor's Report was given by Rev. David Juhl. Attendance during the month of September averaged 112 per weekend. He has added one more member to the homebound list as Sharry Rittmeyer is staying home more often. Madison North and South Circuit Matters: Living Christ, Madison & St. Paul's remain vacant. Looking ahead: North and South Wisconsin District will have a joint pastors conference in Rothschild on October 21-23. There will be NO MONDAY NIGHT DIVINE SERVICE on October 21st. The next concert in our series of Marion Hendrickson Memorial Organ Concerts is Sunday, December 8th at 3:00 PM. Mr. Jason Snodie from Waukesha will perform that afternoon. All three dates in the 2025 series are filled. Pastor will announce the performers at the December 8th concert. He also mentioned that there have been a number of new families checking out our services here at St. Peter's.

Vicar reported that he is settling into his sermon rotation, is teaching the New Testament to the 6th and 7th grade midweek students and having them
