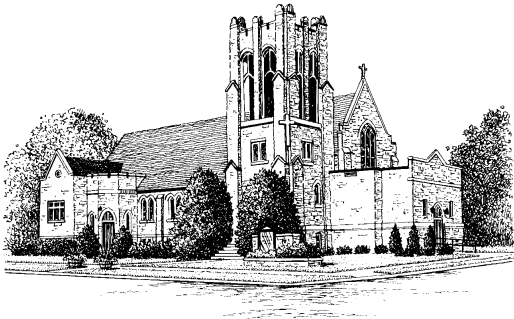

Beloved in the Lord:

A change of seasons is upon us. I have started to close the blinds in the study every morning because the sun shines in my eyes when I sit at my desk. Pretty soon the trees will bud and flourish. By the time you read these words, the Brewers and the Cubs will play each other to start the baseball season. Springtime has arrived, and not a moment too soon!

With the arrival of spring comes this joyful Eastertide. Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! Now there's a word for sore ears as we haven't said it in church since late January. Eastertide is more than one Sunday in springtime. Eastertide is a season that spills into May and prepares the way for our Lord's Ascension and Pentecost, the descent of the Holy Spirit upon our Lord's faithful after His ascension.

This month I'll let the late Professor Martin Franzmann, a gifted teacher, preacher, and author, speak to us about Saint Paul's "resurrection chapter", First Corinthians chapter fifteen. This is from a

sermon he preached and is featured in the book *Ha! Ha! Among the Trumpets*.

"[Christ's] resurrection is the first and decisive blast of God's great final music. That music cannot cease because the score is written by God, and He writes no unfinished symphonies. As surely as Adam once set a fatal deathward cadence for mankind and make all human life a march of death, so surely has Christ reversed that cadence and made it a music that shall surge inevitably upward to eternal life. The risen Son of God must reign; He shall go His way of ministry to the utmost end until all enemies are put under His feet, even the last enemy, death, until He presents to the Father a Son's obedience and a Son's gift: a world made wholly God's again, a world in which divine life triumphs and the living God is All in all."

Now that'll preach! Our wailing has been turned to dancing as Jesus leaps forward from the grave as the firstborn from the dead. So shall you and I come leaping from our graves when our Savior returns to judge the living and the dead. Death

has been swallowed up in Christ's victory over sin and death. The Church's song both here in our earthly sojourn and there in eternal bliss is resurrection. All who have died the first death in baptism need not fear the second death of the grave. Christ has triumphed! He is living! So shall we live, too!

# Music Ministry



A WALK Through the LITURGY  
The AGNUS DEI

In an earlier article, we talked a little bit about the terms Ordinary and Proper and how they are used in the Divine Service. Let's have a quick refresher:

A Proper is a part of the service that changes from week to week. Generally, this title refers to the Scriptures sections appointed for that particular day. These include all the readings, the Introit, the Psalm, and the Verse. An Ordinary is an element of the liturgy that is ordinarily included in the Divine Service. Often hymns, they include the Kyrie, the Gloria in Excelsis, the Creed, the Sanctus. Today we come to the final Ordinary hymn: the Agnus Dei. The hymn itself came into the Liturgy around the beginning of the 8th Century. It is believed that it was put in by the recommendation of Pope Sergius I, who served from 687-701AD.

In light of the Sacrament of the Altar which the congregation is preparing to receive we get to actually "look upon the Lamb of God", Jesus Christ, present in his body and blood on the altar, calling us to eat and drink it for the forgiveness of our sins. The hymn also picks up nearly all the other themes of the Divine Service liturgy.

The title "Lamb of God" comes from the statement by John the Baptist in John 1:29. *(The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him, and said,*

*"Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!")* However, the image of the Lamb of God is something that is everywhere in the Old Testament. The work of Atonement is prominent. The Lamb led to the slaughter now has now been slain and been sacrificed at the cross. Paul shows us through many of his writings to Christ is our Passover Lamb. Now alive again, Jesus gives us the very things that were a sacrifice. The Lamb stands at the throne and gives his faithful people His gifts, namely forgiveness of sins and his peace.



The hymn typically has 3 stanzas, three petitions, where the congregation asks for Christ to have mercy on them in the first two stanzas. In the third, the congregation asks for the peace of Christ, which they just heard in the Pax Domini. Again, like the Lord's Prayer, our prayer is answered in the receiving of the Sacrament of the Altar.

Christ's body and His blood is there, we all get to set our eyes on the "Lamb of God, who has come!" The petition of the Sanctus is fulfilled. The One who comes in the Name of the Lord is with us. Now, we not only get to behold Him, but we get to come forward to His table to be fed His body and His Blood. Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!

As you may know, St. Peter's congregation has requested a vicar for the 2023-2024 academic year. We have not received a vicar since Vicar (now Pastor) Jeff Kazmierski concluded his vicarage in the summer of 2019.



Perhaps you are wondering what is a vicar and what does a vicar do? A vicar is a ministerial intern. He is deployed to a congregation for twelve months of on the job training under a pastor who supervises his work. The vicarage is designed to expose the student studying for the Holy Ministry to the day-to-day work of ministry, as well as introduce him to the regular rotation of congregational meetings, preparing for Bible studies and confirmation instruction, sermon preparation, homebound and hospital visitation, Vacation Bible School, and more. Vicars are a blessing to our congregation. We learn as much from them as they learn from us.

The vicar and his family (if he is married) will live in the home on Ellickson Street next door to the church building. Our congregation provides him a monthly stipend, as well as pays for his health insurance and most utilities.

We will know by late April whether or not we will receive a vicar. As we wait, please be aware that funding the vicar is a matter outside our annual spending guidelines. Your generous contributions make it possible for us to be blessed by his presence.

How might you help? A vicar costs our congregation approximately \$40,000 a year. Any contribution you are able to make above your regular offerings is greatly appreciated. One way to consider how you might help is to see your gift as a sponsorship of the vicar's time among us. Here's how that looks:

- \$3,350 for a month
- \$775 for a week
- \$110 for a day
- \$55 for half a day
- \$10 for an hour

These figures are not the only way to sponsor a vicar. Whatever gift you give, great or small, serves to bless a vicar so that he may bless us with his God-given talents as he grows in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. You may give using your usual offering envelope, noting on the envelope that the gift is designated for the vicarage program. Please speak to Lynnette about how you may give electronically to the vicarage program if that is your preferred way to give.

The best way to support a vicar is to pray for him. Pray that his time of learning among us is a blessing for him. Pray that we are blessed by his presence, too. Pray the Lord of the harvest to supply workers to sow the seed of God's Word, that He provides a bountiful harvest of souls.

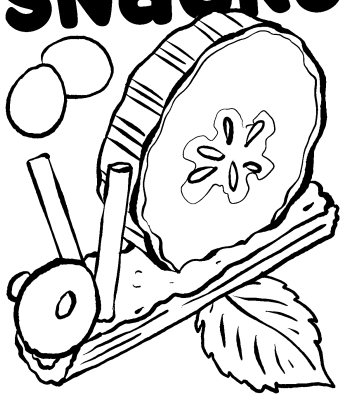

## COUNCIL MINUTES March 14, 2023

The March 14th meeting of the St. Peter's Lutheran Church council meeting was called to order by President Cameron Gramse at 6:31 pm. This meeting was held in the sanctuary. Pastor Juhl opened with a devotion from Mark 9. It is human nature to want to be first, to be the greatest. And yet, Jesus put a small child in front of His disciples and said, "Whoever receives one such child in my name receives me, and whoever receives me, receives not me, but Him who sent me." We should not overthink these words but don't underthink them either. Take God's word for what it is.

Agenda was presented. Paul Yamriska moved approval, Keith Podoll second, motion carried.

Secretary's minutes were read. Paul Yamriska moved to approve the report, Meg Hanson second, carried.

Financial Secretary's report was read by Lynnette Taylor. A very solid February and first two months of the year concerning the financial report of St. Peter's congregation. Remembering that \$18,500 is needed each month for our predicted expenses for the year, there was \$21,552 received in February. We had 125% of last February for general expense offerings; 160% of last February for Missions. Significant February special purpose funding saw \$1330 come in for the building line; \$6018 for the stain glass window (between memorials dedicated and specific donations); and \$2050 for the sanctuary roof. February online was 5.4% for general expense offering; 15.2% for mission offerings. Through two month of the calendar year, general expense offering are at 116.4% ahead of last year and missions are 177.4% of last year. General expense offerings are at 116.3% of what is needed to meet predicted expenses through 9 Sundays and the missions are at 185.4% of what is needed to meet obligations through 9 Sundays. Pretty solid first two weeks of March 2023 for deposits also. Bill Steffenhagen moved to accept the report, Brad Larson seconded, motion carried.

Treasurer's report was given by Meg Hanson. The current checkbook balance is \$12,339.39. Meg asked for permission to use some Special Purpose Heat fund money to offset our heat costs as we have had two months of the heat bill being over \$2000. Bill Steffenhagen moved to transfer \$2000 from the heat fund to the general expense fund. Paul Yamriska second, motion carried. Brad Larson moved approval of the treasurer's report, Steve Paskey second, motion carried.

Elder report was presented. Brad Larson reported that supplies for the Easter Egg Hunt event on April 1<sup>st</sup> at 10:00 a.m have all been ordered and some are here already. He still needs to get the food for the day of the event, the donut holes, fruit, and such. Alex Rehlinger reported that Calvary Luncheon was well attended, with three members plus himself and Katie were there to serve. They served a beef stew and a chicken soup along with rolls and chips. There were lots of desserts from the congregation. Calvary is already looking forward to the fall dates for another luncheon. The Elders have sent out cards to the congregation for Lent & Easter. Cantor Zieroth reported that he had a first – he missed an Ash Wednesday service because he couldn't get out of his drive. Thank you to Becky Juhl for stepping in and sub-

stituting on very short notice. The lower SS grades had a great performance this week. Looking to Holy Week when hand bells will play on Maundy Thursday, the choir sings on Good Friday, and there will be plenty of instrumentalists performing Easter Sunday.

The organ is being tuned and necessary repairs for the upcoming concert on April 30<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 pm. Pastor Juhl also mentioned that Henry Schroeder is also looking into getting cameras for that event so that the audience will be able to watch Greg Zelek play the organ.

Trustees report was given by Keith Podoll. The contract for our lawn fertilizer is here. Keith is going to check with William Thurston about the mowing for the summer. The furnace that heats the new addition is starting to wear out after more than twenty years in use. Rock Solid has given us a rough estimate of \$6,000 for the heater or \$11,000 for the heater and A/C. Keith will bring more solid numbers as they become available.

Board of Christian Education report began with the current enrollment of the center is steady at 25. They are happy with how our volunteers have been getting the 4-K room put back together after the Lenten suppers. They are still looking for full-time, part-time teachers and volunteers. The 4-K program is going well. Sunday school and Midweek classes are all going well as are the three Bible classes. Dates for VBS are being discussed.

Pastor's report began with Pastor Juhl letting us in on Madison North and South Circuit matters. Rev. Dan Torkelson has accepted the call to serve as Pastor of Mount Olive Lutheran Church in Madison. He will be installed on Sunday, April 30<sup>th</sup>. Our Savior Deaf Lutheran Church in Madison will be voting on March 19<sup>th</sup> to put their building up for sale and move in with Monona Lutheran Church. Monona Lutheran will vote on March 26<sup>th</sup> to accept Our Savior Deaf as partners in ministry. Calvary Lutheran Chapel on the UW Campus and Living Christ, Madison are in the calling process for a new sole pastor. Bethlehem, Sun Prairie has asked for a candidate from our seminaries for their new associate pastor. Looking ahead here at St. Peter's: the Spring District Pastors Conference is April 17-19 in Manitowoc so there will be no Monday night Divine Service on April 17<sup>th</sup>. Confirmation is set for the 10:30 Divine Service on Sunday, April 23<sup>rd</sup>. Pastor and the Elders will have an informal conversation with the confirmands Wed, April 12<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 PM in preparation for confirmation. We will know either April 24<sup>th</sup> or April 26<sup>th</sup> whether or not we receive a vicar for the 2023-24 academic year. Greg Zelek, Principal Organist for the Madison Symphony Orchestra, will perform in concert at St. Peter's on Sunday, April 30<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 PM.

There were no membership changes  
There was no old business.

New business consisted of a discussion on the Easter breakfast. Barb Plenty has applied for a Thrivent Action Team for that event.

Motion to adjourn made by Steve Paskey, second by Brad Larson, motion carried at 7:05pm. Lord's prayer was recited by all.

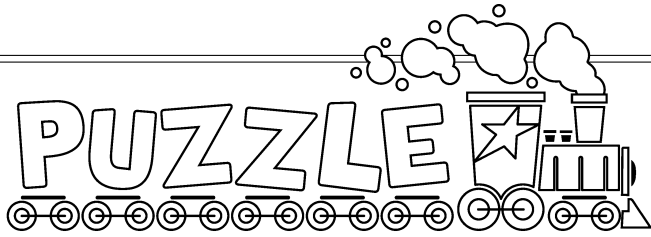

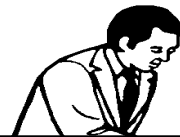
